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McGrady Clips 1:09.4, 46.9r

Detroit, Mich., March 11-12--A couple of sophomores stole the show from the upperclassmen at the second annual NCAA meet. One has just started to paste clippings into his scrapbook, while the other has had a famous past that preceded him into college.

Martin McGrady proved his 600 mark at Louisville was no fluke as he beat a select field of sub-1:10 men with a meet record of 1:09.4, a tenth over the 11-lap mark. Gerry Lindgren pulled away from cross country champ John Lawson on the last lap to knock 15 seconds off the NCAA record with an 8:41.4.

McGrady started off his NCAA activities by equalling the meet record in the prelims with a come-from-behind kick that nipped Iowa State's Steve Carson, 1:10.0 to 1:10.1. To cap his first day, he ran a 47.8 anchor leg after surviving a right jab by Iowa's Mike Mondane that sent Marty spinning to the top of the bank in the midpoint of the leg. Resorting to his Louisville plan, McGrady bolted into the lead in the 600 final and carried the field to a 49.8 quarter. At that point Carson pulled a stride ahead on the turn, but Martin's response prevented him from getting by. Tom Farrell started his kick on the backstretch, passing Dave Crook, the Big 8 champ, in the process. Coming off the final turn, it was three abreast with McGrady slightly ahead of Carson and Farrell. They both made stabs at McGrady, but he mustered the necessary speed to stay out in front to the wire. His ability to accelerate several times in the stretch was reminiscent of Tom Courtney. McGrady had 1:09.4 to Carson's 1:09.5, and for some reason Farrell who crossed the line with Carson was given an additional tenth.

The two-mile was figured to be a race between John Lawson and Lindgren, and that is the way it turned out. Lindgren started fast with a 61.5 quarter and a 2:06.2 half with Lawson right on his heels. Further back there was a battle shaping up between Lindgren's teammate, Chris Westman, and Doug Brown. The pace at the mile was 4:18.1, and at the 1½ mile mark was 6:31.0. With 60 yards on the nearest rivals, the two L's began to pick up the pace. Lawson made up a bit at the gun lap; Lindgren held him off and then started to pull away with a half lap left to win in 8:41.4. Lawson came second in 8:43.2. The first five finishers bettered the meet record of 8:56.4. Lindgren was disappointed that he was not in the 8:30s, but he has had stomach flu.

Two more Kansans won miles. Jim Ryun loafed through the Invitational mile with clockings of 60.8, 2:04.2 and 3:07.3, and then uncorked a final 56.0 effort to set an arena record of 4:03.3. For the first three quarters he was closely followed by Kent Andersson, Eastern Kentucky's Swedish freshman, and Frank Murphy, Villanova's Irish frosh. Ryun heard their pounding footsteps, but he was not worried. He seemed to enjoy the race, because it was one of the few races that he was not sick after. Fellow Kansan Conrad Nightengale of Kansas State, just missed making Ryun's arena record last only a night as he clocked 4:03.4 in winning the championship mile. Nightengale did set a meet record, while the first five all bettered the old mark. Nightengale gave a portent of things to come in the trials when he clipped three-tenths off the old mark with a 4:07.7 off a 61.0, 2:06.0 and 3:06.2 pace. It was a powerful front running race. His pace in the finals was 60.3, 2:02.4 and 3:04.3, but he was not the pace setter. Ed Dean led with 59.0, 2:01.0 and 4:03.4, but as Dean faded Nightengale kept on churning away. Soph Sam Bair of Kent State came on strong in the end to shunt Dean to third.

Rick Urbina of Georgetown failed by a tenth in getting a meet record in the 880 with his time of 1:51.9 as he beat Villanova soph Dave Patrick. Urbina probably missed the record, because he was content to follow the pace back in third position and then unleash a devastating kick on the last lap. Urbina came back to anchor Georgetown in the two-mile relay with a 1:49.5, but all his team could do was third as a balanced Oklahoma State team retained its title with a 7:30.2. Villanova's all sophomore unit was second in the same time as Georgetown's, 7:31.0, with Patrick running a 1:49.8. Dennis Carr, anchoring for Southern Cal, ran a superb 1:49.0 leg that was overlooked as his team wound up fourth. McGrady's 46.9 leg in an-

choring Central State was also not announced to the crowd. Morgan State won the mile relay with a balanced team in 3:16.5 to Central's 3:16.8. Southern U, which did 3:14.4 two months earlier on the same track, did not comply with the new NCAA scholastic standards, and was left to cool their heels in a Detroit hotel.

Charlie Greene had no trouble in defending his sprint title, as he knocked a tenth off his old mark with a 6.0. The next three places went to sophs Ray Pollard of Morgan State, Craig Wallace of Kentucky State and Jim Freeman of Murray State. The hurdles were a different story. It was a photo finish between Jerry Cerulla, the eventual winner, and Dave Hemery in 7.2. Cerulla's win could be credited to Hayes Jones' former coach, George Marshall, who helped Jerry with his start earlier in the week. He hit the first hurdle in two seconds as planned. He felt sure that he could win, so he had his parents on hand for the victory.

Seton Hall's Herb Germann closed out his indoor college career with a sluggish 2:12.9 1000 victory. Nebraska's Peter Scott won a close battle for second from Kansas' Lowell Paul, 2:13.3 to 2:13.4.

Otis Burrell cleared 7'0" and Frank Costello did not. The high jump was marred by the inch increments in which the bar was moved up. Otis tried 7'2" and missed. Stenius won the long jump with a meet record of 25'7" that was six inches better than his second best mark. George Woods took the shot from a balanced field with a 61'3¼" toss. The first four men spanned 15 inches with their heaves. Bill Fosdick took the pole vault at 16'¼".

Kansas kept the team title, which Missouri won last year, in the Big 8 by edging out Southern Cal, 14 to 13. And little Central Ohio State tied Nebraska for third. Central State has only three scholarships for track, a greatly reduced track budget and McGrady only gets \$300 aid.

The meet attracted about 100 more athletes than last year's meet. The announcing was still poor, and meet officials still insist on awarding places in separate heats on time basis. The 440 had the winners of the two heats tied for the title on time with a 48.9. It seems silly, especially since the timers belong to the Phil Diamond school of timing, in which the center of gravity of the runner counts and not the torso from the neck down, which is the basis that finish judges use.

Seagren Ups Vault Mark to 17'3-4"

Cleveland, O., March 18--It's beginning to appear that Bob Seagren may be dubbed the "ceiling unlimited boy" when he gets outdoors.

The Glendale Junior College student, competing for the Southern California Striders, again hoisted the world indoor record--this time to 17' 3/4" for the artistic highlight of the Cleveland K of C meet.

Seagren, who won't be 20 until Oct. 17, used seven vaults as he added a half-inch to his national AAU championship mark of two weeks ago. The capacity throng of 94'8 accorded him a standing ovation twice--the second after he failed at 17'4 1/2" in an attempt to exceed Fred Hansen's world outdoor mark.

Seagren didn't begin competition until the bar was at 15'6". He cleared that and 16'0" on his first tries. He then had two misses at 16'5 3/4" before he soared over it to displace John Uelses' meet record of 16'4 1/2" set in 1964. He had a rather mediocre looking miss in his first assault at the plus-17 level. But on his second attempt, everything clicked. He was still going up after he had passed the bar at 17' 3/4". "Everything clicked on that one," the handsome Californian said. "And I was a trifle surprised it did, because, as you can see I cut and bruised my right elbow when I hit the edge of the pit on a miss."

Christos Papanikolaou of Greece, the Balkan Games champion now at Western Michigan, took second place at 16'0" on fewer misses from Mel Hein, the 1965 Cleveland meet winner.

Another field event, the high jump, provided the fans with their number two thrill. Stanley Albright, the 19-year-old Glenville High School boy of this city--now overage for schoolboy competition--soundly defeated an off-form John Thomas. Albright soared over 6'11 3/4", within a quarter-inch of Bill McClellon's all-time high school high. Thomas could manage only 6'8" but generously aided the schoolboy with advice.

As expected, the 600 was the piece de resistance on the 12-lap track here. Martin McGrady, the 19-year-old Central Ohio State sophomore who has had a brilliant winter, defeated big names Tom Farrell and Bill Crothers. McGrady led all the way as he

clocked 1:11.0. Crothers was shuffled back as they came off the first turn, losing valuable ground. He and Farrell both tried to come off the pace, but their roaring finishes still left the St. John's star at 1:11.1 and the Canadian ace at 1:11.3.

Later, McGrady anchored in 48.1 as Central State won the fastest of six one-mile relays in 3:18.8. Again, McGrady held off Farrell. Tennessee was third after an anchor lap fall that put Iowa's 3:14.4 team out of the race completely. They were trailing at the time, however.

Willie Davenport, looking sharp before his home state friends, clicked 6.0 to take the 50-yard high hurdles. The time was only a tenth off the world indoor best. But another national AAU champion, schoolboy Bill Gaines of Clearview, Mullica Hills, N.J., was inched out by Fordham's Sam Perry in the 50-yard dash as all four finalists were caught in 5.3. A tie for third was declared between Notre Dame freshman Bill Hurd and Bowling Green's Mid-American Conference champion, Henry Williams.

Nobody would cut the pace in the two-mile, and Tom Laris finally uncorked a 58.7 last quarter to win in 8:51.2. The mile was the same story. Lacking fast pace, Kent State sophomore Sammy Bair spirited to edge Notre Dame's Ed Dean in 4:10.6.

An erroneous lap-card count spoiled the 1000. Bob Lipscomb of Central Ohio State won the one-lap short race (on time given), as Darnell Mitchell was second and Gary Wilson third.

Texas Southern Speeds 1:23.2

Houston, Tex., March 18-19--Sprint speed was the order of the day at the 15th running of the Texas Southern Relays and Southern University had the most as they won four of six relays and four open events, but it was Texas Southern that turned in the meet's most outstanding mark. In the Friday afternoon 880 relay beats a team of Arnaldo Bristol, Roy Hicks, Clyde Duncan and James Hines as-tounded everyone, including coach Stan Wright, with a blazing 1:23.2, fastest in the world this year and only six-tenths off Ahlene Christian's 1958 world mark of 1:22.6. In the Saturday finals the 10,000 fans were looking for a record from the Tigers, but it was the Southern team of Grundy Harris, George Anderson, Everett Mason and Theron Lewis that won by a fifth in an excellent 1:23.4. Southern had won its heat with an easy 1:24.4 and Grambling, which qualified with a 1:26.2, scratched from the final. Had the race been run earlier in the evening the record might have fallen. But most of the TSU men had run on the 40.4 440 relay team, Hicks had also just finished the high hurdles, and Lewis had run a good 1:50.9 leg on Southern's winning two-mile relay team.

Last year's four best frosh quarter-milers--Webster Johnson, Mason, Anthony Gates and Robert Johnson--teamed to run a winning 3:09.7 mile relay with Mason leading the way with a 46.2 leg. Gates won the open 440 in 47.8. Robert Johnson also had two 880 relay legs, one on the 7:38.0 two-mile relay win and the other as anchorman on the good 3:20.5 sprint medley win. In the latter race Southern and Texas Southern were even at the 440 handoff, but Theron Lewis uncorked a 45.5 leg to give Johnson a comfortable lead over closing George Hunt of TSU.

In the high hurdles Roy Hicks had a poor start and tangled with several hurdles before catching teammate Bristol at the half way mark to win in 13.9. Bristol clocked 14.1 which followed a 14.0 in the Friday prelims. Hicks also ran 13.9 in the prelims with a very smooth, effortless race until he toppled the final barrier. Elgy Sams of Southern won the intermediate hurdles in 52.9 with TSU frosh Ken St. Julian following in 53.3.

John Hartfield, over seven-feet three times this year, passed

Vanderstock In Sharp 50.0 400 Hurdles

Walnut, Calif., March 19--Geoff Vanderstock raced to a remarkable early season 400-meter intermediate hurdle clocking of 50.0--raising him to equal 14th best on the all-time performer list. Only one hurdler ran the intermediates faster in the world last year.

In 1965, the Mt. SAC junior college who is now a sophomore, ran the highs in 14.0 and held the JC record in the 330 hurdles at 36.4 and the 440 hurdles at 51.3. He ran the 14.0 and 36.4 on the same day, and was injured shortly thereafter and was out of competition for five weeks late in the spring.

He is now tied for ninth fastest in the US with Jerry Tarr's 50.3 for 440-yards (three-tenth conversion factor). He lowered the intermediate mark for meters in the JC ranks from his own best.
