Texas Southern Dashes 39.9, 1:23.4

Prairie View, Tex., Mar. 25-26--Texas Southern continued to be the scourge of the southern US relay teams of the early 1966 outdoor season as they romped within tenths of world records in the 440 and 880 relays. James Hines brought home the baton in a superlative 39.9 which is only 0.2 off Stanford's 1965 world record. Joining Hines were Arnaldo Bristol, Roy Hicks and Clyde Duncan as they blasted around the two turns to equal the second best time ever which was first posted by an Australian National Team.

With Hines again anchoring the aptly nicknamed Flying Tigers, Texas Southern slashed within 0.8 of the 880 relay world record as Duncan, Bobby Evans and Hicks did the preliminary scurrying and baton passing to win with relatively no competition in 1:23.4.

Southern U came back with its equalizer, the mile relay. Running on the good, but somewhat soft, cinders Southern had only to compete against the clock as it edged near its 3:04.5 world mark with 3:07.4. Robert Johnson doubled back from the mile relay to anchor Southern's 3:20.6 sprint medley.

Claremont, Calif., Mar. 26--The Pennel-Seagren vaulting duel edged further upward at the Claremont Relays with John Pennel coming out on top this time. The time was 6:17 p.m. and there was barely enough light to see but Pennel projected over the crossbar at 17'1" to defeat his roommate, who could do no better than 16'0". The height, which ties him for third with Fred Hansen on the all-time performance list, was measured before the vault at 17'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", but John ticked the bar which in turn rotated it to measure $\frac{1}{2}$ " less following the vault. Cars with lights on and people with flashlights helped illuminate the standards as the bar was lifted to 17'5" but Pennel didn't come close on his three attempts.

Tommie Smith, Day Run Fast

Santa Barbara, Calif., Mar. 26--Tommie Smith anchored San Jose State to three relay victories at the 28th annual Easter Relays and then walked off with the most outstanding performer award. UCLA won the team title and served notice to one and all that they will be hard to handle. Cross town rival Southern Cal had its moments also, but May 7, the date of the UCLA-So Cal dual meet, could be a long day for the Trojans.

The Easter Relays, often plagued by windy and rainy weather, got a break from the weatherman and the day was sunny with light winds. Early in the afternoon, Tommie Smith let everyone know that he was the Smith of early last year. In the 880 relay, he received the baton behind such runners as Larry Questad, Norm Jackson and Roger Wolff. He picked them up on the turn and went into overdrive down the short home straight to move away easily. In the 440 relay, he

disposed of the same rivals just as easily. Twenty minutes later the mile relay was under way. Dwight Middleton's 47.8 gave So Cal the lead on the first leg, Tom Jones put UCLA in front with a 47.5 on the second carry but Ken Shackelford's 47.8 gave Smith a two-yard lead and that was as good as money in the bank. Wolff of So Cal went after Tommie and ran with him to the home straight and then faded to fifth as UCLA, Stanford and Arizona went by in the final strides.

Bob Day's 5000 was impressive. Through the first mile, it was Day, Geoff Pyne, George Husaruk, and Chuck Schulz running 66.0 quarters and passing the mile in 4:25.2. Schulz lost contact at this point and the three Bruins ran 67.0 quarters for the second mile, for the 8:53.2 clocking. Husaruk lost contact at two-miles but he ran under nine-minutes for the first time in his life. Day and his Kiwi teammate ran together until there was 220 to go. Then Bob pulled away for victory. It was both Day's (13:44.2) and Pyne's (13:47.4) fastest 5000 by far, and Bob's first comment after the race was "I should have run much faster." Geoff, who is hoping for Commonwealth Games selection, was pleased, in spite of still training on distance build-up.

The pole vault produced great jumping. Four men cleared 16 feet and the bar was raised to 16'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Savage hadn't missed on lower heights and he went over the new UCLA record height on his first try also. On his second try, Ed Martensen went over cleanly but his pole passed under the cross bar. Paul Wilson took three tries, and went over easily on his third vault. At 17'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", Wilson almost won with a very narrow miss on his final try.

The Southern Cal two-mile relay team would appear to have a good chance at the world's record in April and May, and UCLA will also be rough when it has its number one team in operation. So Cal ran a front running race here, and both Dave Buck (1:49.7) and Dennis Carr (1:49.7) looked great as the team ran 7:24.0.

Southern Runs Wild in Relays

Austin, Texas, April 1-2--The 39th Texas Relays lived up to its reputation as one of the great relay meets by keeping 21,000 fans on their feet for much of the two-day meet with spectacular times and torrid competition.

Southern University, winning four of six college division relays, came within 0.7 tenths total of tying three world records and set a collegiate record in a fourth race. George Anderson, Grundy Harris, Theron Lewis and Robert Johnson claimed the collegiate sprint medley record with a second-fastest ever 3:16.5 clocking to topple Baylor's 3:17.0 set last year at the Drake Relays. Southern was challenged by Texas Southern who ran 3:18.3, but Lewis ran a 45.3 to pull away from the 46.3 of James Hines and Johnson's 1:48.7 lengthened the lead over George Hunt's 1:49.3 to easily get the record.

The record was one of the lesser Jaguar achievements in the meet. In the Friday morning prelims, Anthony Gates teamed with Anderson, Harris and Lewis to run a 1:22.9 880-yard relay which included a near stand-still handoff. The time, 0.3 tenths off Abilene Christian's 1958 and 1961 world record runs, ranks as fastest in the world since 1963 and ties three other teams as the fourth fastest of all-time. A great finals race was predicted as Texas Southern and Grambling won their heats with 1:23.9 and 1:24.0. Two weeks ago, Texas Southern had run a 1:23.2 prelim only to lose to Southern in the finals, and Friday night the Tigers got their revenge as Hines held off Lewis at the tape with both teams clocking 1:23.4. Tempers flared as the announcer erred and called the race a tie, so Southern grabbed the clocks given as awards on a flip of the coin, over the strong protests of TSU coach Stan Wright. Long after the meet was over the error was discovered, and though Texas Southern won the race it will have to wait for a second set of clocks to be mailed.

Also on Friday morning, Harvey Nairn and Webster Johnson teamed with Harris and Anderson to clock 40.0 in the 440-yard relay prelims. Here again two of the passes were atrocious. Grambling was second in 40.3 with Richard Stebbins anchoring, while Texas Southern won its heat in 40.5. In the Saturday finals, Southern clocked a rapid 39.9 to tie Texas Southern's week-old mark as the fastest in the world this year and equal fifth fastest of all-time. Anderson, with a four yard lead at the handoff, held off Hines' closing rush as the Tigers clocked 40.1 and Grambling failed to finish as second leg man Winston Shortt pulled a muscle.

Probably the most exciting college division race was the final mile relay. Southern had run a 3:08.0 in the Friday prelims with Gates and Webster Johnson running 46.2 and 45.8 while Lewis paced through the anchor leg in 47.8. In the finals, both Texas Southern and Grambling scratched due to injuries and the winner was never in doubt. Webster Johnson came off the blocks with a 46.7 followed by Gates in 46.4. The crowd was on its feet screaming for a record as Robert Johnson came in with a 46.0 and Theron Lewis ripped off a 45.6 after a hard day's work to give Southern a 3:04.7, third only to Arizona State's 3:04.5 in 1963 and tied by Southern last year. All in all, Southern ran seven great sprint relay races and had the baton passing been anywhere near decent, three world records would have fallen.

Indicating middle distance strength as well, Southern won the two-mile relay in 7:27.2 after another duel with Texas Southern. The teams were even coming into the first handoff, but Jaguar Henry Brown fell and Robert Johnson was 40 yards back after picking up the baton. Looking like the race was only a 440, Johnson caught Tiger Darryl Bartlow within 350 yards and did not fade over the final lap as he clocked a great 1:47.0 leg. Lewis (1:50.0) stayed close to George Hunt (1:49.6) and Darrow Dotson won it all with a 1:52.2 as the Tiger anchorman faded badly.

For his 45.3, 45.6, 1:50.0 and 880-yard relay anchor, Lewis was named the college division's top performer and Southern U unani-

mously took the team title.

In the university division, Charlie Christmas ran a great 4:01.8 anchor to give Abilene Christian a 9:36.6 distance medley win over a 9:42.6 for Kansas. ACC's time is the fifth fastest of all-time and only 2.5 seconds off UCLA's 1965 world record. Oklahoma State was in the lead by virtue of John Metcalf's 1:50.0, but Don Payne gave Kansas State the lead with a 45.5 over Houston's Tony Pickett (46.4). The 1320 legs were fantastic. Oklahoma State regained the lead as Tom Von Ruden ran a 2:56.2 with Richard Levy of Houston going 2:57.4 (fastest ever by a Texan) and Al Van Troba of ACC 2:57.5. Best time, however, was a 2:55.7 by Lowell Paul to bring Kansas back into contention. Christmas made up a 10 yard deficit and poured on the coal as he ran away from Kansas' John Lawson, 4:01.3 to 4:05.6.

One of the anticipated top races was the mile as Jim Ryun, the Kansas running machine, was entered. Jim led through a 60.9 quarter but was content to follow with laps of 65.7 and 62.6 before uncorking a 54.7 final lap to win in 4:03.9. Only John Camien (4:05.0) could stay close over the final lap as he suffered his first Texas Relays defeat in five years.

Randy Matson, still underweight and competing in only his third meet of the year, let the world know he is out to smash his own world record as he flipped the iron ball 65'4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " on his first toss. His other four valid marks were in the 60-62 foot range. Randy also defended his relay's discus title with a 169'10" throw and it is evident he intends to concentrate on the shot this year with hopes of reaching 72-feet.

Texas was named the top university division team and Presto Davis was the top individual for his and their great come from behind wins in the sprint medley and two-mile relays. The latter was the upset of the meet as Oklahoma State, with John Perry, Von Ruden and Metcalf back from last year's world record team, was favored to win easily. It was a two team race from the start as David Webb led Aggie Arnold Droke at the handoff, 1:54.4 to 1:55.0, and Perry took over Bob O'Bryan with a 1:49.3. Richard Romo, passing up a chance to run in the open mile, caught Metcalf with a 1:50.5 and gave Prest Davis a six-yard lead which he held over fast-closing Von Ruden. Final times were 7:27.2 and 7:27.4. In the sprint medley, Texas 220 man Steve Langham suffered a leg cramp while leading 50 yards from the handoff. O'Bryan, 30 yards behind ran 47.1 but couldn't go as Oklahoma's Bill Calhoun sped to a 46.6 lap. Davis took the baton well behind, closed the gap rapidly, and won going away with a 1:48 leg to give Texas a 3:20.7 win.
