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Carius' 8:48.8 Steeple Sharp Improvement

Lexington, Ky., April 8-9--Al Carius, who concentrated on the steeplechase for the first time last year and ran 9:05.2, zipped to an 8:48.8 clocking in the distance barrier event to rank as the 10th fastest performer in US history. In improving his time by 16.4 seconds, Carius had to fight chilly weather and intermittent sleet showers at the Kentucky Relays.

In addition to the steeplechase, other barrier-running races produced excellent results, with Tennessee's Pat Pomphrey nabbing the 330 intermediates in 37.4 and Tennessee A&I's Marcellous Reed victorious in the highs with 13.8--same time given runner-up Pomphrey.

A quadruplicate, blanket 100-yard dash finish saw Jim Freeman, Trenton Jackson, Bill Hurd and Jim Webster finish in that order, all clocking 9.5. Notre Dame soph Ed Dean ripped through a 4:06.0 mile anchor leg in the distance medley relay.

Davenport Races to Questionable 13.2

Baton Rouge, La., April 9--Southern U's 22-year-old freshman, Willie Davenport, swept to a 13.2 clocking for the 120-yard high hurdles which would equal Martin Lauer's and Lee Calhoun's world mark if all the conditions were proper--and there is some indication that they may not have been legal. A crosswind of 3.8 mph was reported.

Even the non-winning times were super-sensational. Texas Southern's Arnaldo Bristol ran 13.4, followed by Southern's Harvey Nairn (13.9), Texas Southern's Bernard Cage (14.0) and Ken St. Julian (14.1).

Kirk Clayton of Scotlandville High School in Baton Rouge equalled the national high school prep record of 9.4 for 100-yards. The race was assisted by a legal 4.1 mph wind.

Southern won the 440-yard, mile, sprint medley and two-mile relays, in 40.2, 3:06.0, 3:17.5 and 7:26.2. Arkansas AM&N took the 880-yard relay when both Southern and Texas Southern were disqualified.

Southern's George Anderson annexed the 100 in 9.4, followed by Prairie View's Doug Broadus in 9.5. The first two places in the 220 went to unknowns. Oliver Ford of Southern's New Orleans campus took the honors in 20.7, while Alcorn A&M's Doc Mosley was second in 20.8. It was run around a turn, and the wind was negligible.

Ryun Steps Off 8:47.4 Best-Ever

Lafayette, La., April 9--Kansas freshman Jim Ryun, troubled since the onset of the outdoor campaign by blisters on his feet, and senior teammate John Lawson stayed behind home-town favorite Mel Robison through seven laps of the Southwestern Relays two-mile feature event. Then Ryun, who was still undecided Friday night whether to run, unleashed a devastating kick to run the final lap in an overwhelming 56.4 for a personal best of 8:47.4. Lawson outdistanced Robison, 8:48.8 to 8:56.6.

Northeast Louisiana's Ronnie Fountain sprinted to a 9.4 century mark with the aid of too much wind, and anchored the 440 and 880 relays. Roger Mann dipped 0.1 below 14.0 in the 120 highs while Lamar Tech's Gerald Williams and Kansas' Gary Ard and Art Cortez showed promise with all three recording jumps over 25-feet.

Steinhauer Becomes 4th Farthest Putter

Seattle, Wash., April 9--His teammates call him Od Job, bed after the Korean henchman in Goldfinger. A Washington foe lauded him Namu II, after Seattle's famous captive killer whale. But no matter what he's called, Oregon shot putter Neal Steinhauer is big and he gets the job done in a like manner, as he did in Washington versus Oregon dual.

The 6'5", 260-pound Oregon junior from North Eugene, Or High School, continued his phenomenal development pattern here under wet conditions in the Washington shot put ring. Steinhauer heaved the 16-pound iron ball 65'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " to move into fourth place on the all-time world list. Incomparable Randy Matson of Texas A&M hit the top spot with 70'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Dallas Long, 1964 Olympic Games champion runner-up with a 67'10" effort and Bill Nieder, '60 Olympic title holder at 65'10". The put is 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " inches behind Matson's best this season.

"I guess I'll have to come up here in the rain country more often," the likeable behemoth said. "I just can't do the same when the sun shines. It didn't look exceptionally good, but it is the best toss I've ever had in practice or competition. Last month I put on an even 65-feet in practice.

"I was hoping for 64'3" so I could get past (Arthur) Rowe of the world list. I haven't set any objectives because I honestly feel that they can limit an individual. But, I think I'm just getting started. Steinhauer's series was 63'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", foul, 65'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", foul, 62'0" and 63'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". The prodigious heave broke his personal and Oregon school record of 63'8" set April 2 at an all-comers meet in Eugene. Steinhauer turned in a notable double, hurling the discus 177'2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " for a first-place, and his second-best platter effort ever--only a half-inch behind his top mark.

"I think my weight work has helped considerably. Strength

is the key thing in putting the shot. I'm now up to 260-pounds with the press. Running has also aided me. Three days before the meet, I did some stair running at Hayward Field (Oregon's football stadium) to build up my legs. That's the first time I've attempted that kind of workout but it sure helped my lift today," Neal continued.

Texas Southern Upsets Southern Twice

Grambling, La., Apr. 16--Texas Southern got back on the winning side again in its short-sprint relay duels with Southern U, as the Houston school raced to victories of 40.1 and 1:22.9 in the 440- and 880-yard relays in the Grambling Relays.

Texas Southern, who earlier this year along with Southern had posted 39.9 clockings, won from Southern by a tenth, as Grambling, without Winston Shortt and with Richard Stebbins for only the second time in more than five weeks, was third in 40.3. TSU ran with its regular crew of Arnaldo Bristol, Roy Hicks, Clyde Duncan, and James Hines. TSU matched Southern's nation-leading 880-yard relay time of 1:22.9 as Southern could only run 1:23.2 followed by Grambling's 1:23.6. Texas Southern used the same four-some except that Bobby Evans replaced Bristol, as usual.

The only events Southern could salvage were the mile relay and the two-mile relay as Prairie View won the sprint medley in 3:19.6 and Grambling took the distance medley in 10:01.4. Southern won the mile relay in 3:05.1 with Webster Johnson, Anthony Gates, Robert Johnson and Theron Lewis, and the two-mile relay in 7:35.0.

George Anderson won the 100 in 9.5--a time he also posted in a heat. The high jump resulted in something of an upset as Southern's Robert Lee won it at 6'11", trailed by Texas Southern's John Hartfield at 6'10".

Kimihara Leads Japanese to Marathon Sweep

Boston, Mass., April 19--Kenji Kimihara led his Japanese teammates to a 1-2-3-4-sweep of the Boston Marathon. The 25-year-old Kimihara won the 70th annual race in 2:17:11.0 to post the 20th victory by a foreign runner in the past 21 years. While records were set at five of the six check points, Kimihara's winning time fell short of the course mark of 2:16:33 set by Morie Shigematsu, who led the Japanese finish of 1-2-3-5-6 in 1965. Shigematsu failed to qualify in Japan for a return appearance.

Second was Seiichiro Sasaki in 2:17:24, while the team captain Tooru Terasawa was third in 2:17:46.

Two-time winner Aurele Vandendriessche of Belgium missed his plane, and did not run in the race.

The first American finisher was Norm Higgins of the Santa Monica Athletic Club, whose 2:18:26 clocking merited him a fifth place finish.

Brumel Suffers Setback

Ill-luck is pursuing Valeriy Brumel, Soviet high jumper, who sustained a complicated fracture of the leg in a motorcycle accident five months ago. He is again under the doctors, having dislocated the bone of his right leg after he tried to go up stairs without his crutches.

Brumel was taken to the Central Traumatology and Orthopaedic Institute, where Dr. Otar Gudushauri, using a compression apparatus of his own design, again put the bone together. Four metallic needles firmly fasten the injured bone of the shank.

Professor Mstislav Volkov, director of the institute, believes that Brumel will have to remain in the hospital for several months. He said Brumel had begun to walk far too early. The bone callus was not yet strong enough and the process of recovery was somewhat retarded as a result of osteomyelitis. Professor Volkov had nothing definite to say about Brumel's sports future.

Brumel, who only a week ago seemed to have splendid prospects, is very disappointed. "Of course, I have only myself to blame for all this," he said. "I succumbed to a kind of hypnosis. Every one was asking me when I would begin jumping again, and I was too hasty. I had already climbed several times to the first floor with crutches and evidently this had its consequences. Suddenly I felt strong pain and found it difficult even with crutches to return to my ward in the Sklifosovsky Institute.

"Now I have to abandon my plans. After treatment in the clinic I think I shall go somewhere for a rest. This will not be before midsummer. Only afterwards shall I begin thinking of sport."

Flowers Seeks Track, Football Glory

Richmond Flowers cherishes a postcard he received two years ago after the Alabama freshmen defeated the Tennessee freshmen 14-0. The card, postmarked Tuscaloosa, Ala., said, "Today the Bear showed what we will show you during your mistaken college career." The card was signed, "People of Alabama".

This seemed like a good time to set the record straight on another point: Had Coach Bryant actually told him back during that recruiting session that Alabama would whip Tennessee every year he (Flowers) was at the school here?

"No," said Flowers. "One of his assistants said that."

Young Flowers wants to play football, but right now he's grossed in track, the sport in which he already excels. At 18 he is one of the best hurdlers in the land... not the best, mind you, or the best. Football is measured on intangibles, track isn't. The cate stopwatch doesn't lie. The stopwatch and the heart govern. Flowers already has shown he respects the first and has plenty of other.

"I love indoor track," Flowers told us before flying to New York, thence to Los Angeles for the Times meet. "It's new to me but you're running before a big crowd and they're so close. The tension builds up. I love that pressure."

Flowers is a six-footer, nicely proportioned at 180 pounds with dark brown hair and hazel eyes that give him a sort of sleek look. He has the crisp manners of a boy well-reared, expresses himself clearly, and dresses neatly. When he speaks of his ambitions in bigtime track and football he does not do so lightly. Even 18 he knows what the odds are on making the Olympic team in 1968 or winning a berth on the Tennessee football team.

Indoor track times don't really mean much. Champions track is run outdoors. Flowers has run the 110-meter hurdles windy 13.5. Willie Davenport, possibly the best now that Haye Jones has retired, has been clocked in 13.4w. Both are college men although Willie is four years older than Richmond. The best ever mark for this event is 13.2, a world's record set seven years ago by Martin Lauer of Germany.

The stopwatch tells you in the most eloquent way possible that Flowers is already in the bigtime when it comes to hurdling was not always so. "In junior high we borrowed a hurdle," he called, "and the coach gave a bunch of us a try at it. I fell flat face and didn't hurdle again until I got into high school."

The fact is, Flowers was something less than a sensation until he had a chance to throw off childhood ailments and grow. In junior year in high school he was beginning to sprout in both football and track. He had been sickly as a child. He finally outgrew a mumps at the age of seven left him completely deaf in his left ear. "I guess I'm lucky it didn't affect my balance," said Flowers.

Flowers is not certain yet just what his best event in track might be. "I never have tried the 220," he pointed out. His best time in the 100 is 9.5.
