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Ryun Zips 3:59.0r, 3:55.8, 47.0r

Lawrence, Kans., April 21-23--Kansas Relay fans watched their own Jim Ryun anchor his frosh team to a national freshman distance medley record with a 3:59.0 leg on Thursday and a 3:55.8 open mile and then a 47.0 final leg in the mile relay on Saturday. It was sunny Thursday, but seven inches of rain fell from 3:30 p.m. Friday to 2:00 a.m. Saturday. On Saturday, it was cloudy and muggy; the track was in fair shape after the work crews burned and steamed rolled it from dawn on.

In his big effort, Ryun followed teammate Tom Yergovich's pace through a 57.6 and 1:58.7. Ryun was all alone for the second half, running as usual against the clock. He passed the 1320 in 3:00.7, and was officially timed at 1500-meters in 3:40.9 to break Archie San Romani's national frosh mark, also set in this meet in 1960, of 3:44.6. His 3:55.8 clocking is the 21st fastest ever run, and is Jim's second best effort. It ruined the frosh mark of 4:02.7 established by Hancock JC's Neill Duggan earlier this season. Ryun said it was the kind of weather he liked for running, and indicated he appreciated the help of Yergovich in the early pace setting chores.

His 3:59.0 two days earlier was run in much different fashion as he needed a 53.6 last lap. The team time of 9:50.4 destroyed the old frosh mark of 9:55.0 of last year by Loyola. And then he came back with a 47.0 in the mile relay. He was voted the athlete of the meet; he won the vote last year though high schoolers aren't eligible to win.

With the abstention of Southern, Texas Southern and Grambling, the highlight of the short relays was focused on the university division for a change and Rice University, which won the 440, 880 and mile relays in 40.7, 1:23.8 and 3:07.4--the latter improving their hold on the second fastest time in the nation by 2.2 seconds. Jimmy Ellington ran the fastest leg of 46.1 on the winning team, although Kansas State's Don Payne equalled the time as he led his team to a 3:09.4 second place.

Oklahoma State and Texas moved into the second stage of their duel in the two-mile relay, with Oklahoma State taking revenge on Texas which upset them at the Texas Relays two weeks earlier. Both teams may be prevented from a truly fast time this year by their slow first men. And it was essentially the difference between these two men that meant the difference between victory and loss. Arnold Droke ran 1:53.1 while David Webb did 1:55.4, and the overall times were 7:22.8 to 7:26.4. Oklahoma State's winning time is the fastest in the nation this year. OSU's Tom Von Ruden ran 1:49.9 to Texas's Bob O'Bryan's 1:50.7, Jim Metcalf's 1:50.6 to Richard Romo's 1:50.7 and John Perry's 1:49.2 to Preston Davis' 1:49.6.

Kansas bettered its own national-leading four-mile relay clocking by 3.4 seconds with a 16:36.8 mark--the best legs coming from Lowell Paul (4:08.1) and John Lawson (4:05.6).

Southern Illinois' Oscar Moore reportedly ran either a 56.0 or 58.0 first quarter during the 5000-meters after the rain had begun, and followed it up with 4:12.0 but slowed to 9:07.0 and 13:57.4 at the two- and three-mile splits. He finished in 14:25.2. Hylke van der Wal won his third consecutive Kansas Relays 3000-meter steeplechase after he hitchhiked here from Chicago with his father after his car broke down. He was clocked in 9:09.6.

Soudek Raises Austrian Mark to 192'11"

Columbus, O., April 22-23--There was one anticipated item and one odd occurrence here today on the 42nd program of the Ohio State Relays--which we'd better not call the Ohio Relays any longer to avoid confusion with the Ohio (University) Relays the previous week. While five meet records fell in addition to the usual rain, Michigan State's Big 10 indoor champions excelled. That was anticipated. A unique item was the creation of a new Austrian national record in the discus throw.

Ernst Soudek, the Austrian Olympian who seems to be getting better with age, accomplished his life-time best of 192'11". Now member of the Ann Arbor Track Club, the ex-Wolverine also had

over 189-feet as he cracked his own meet mark of 184'7" set last year, and also bettered his own Austrian record of 190'4".

Seven of the Big 10 schools were represented here, but Michigan, in the midst of examinations, could only bring 10 men, and tough Wisconsin was absent. So Coach Fran Dittrich's Spartans had a big day, despite the fact three of his best men--including hurdler Clint Jones--were out for spring football practice instead.

Three of the five meet records came in field events, for Ohio State's all-weather track was spongy and not conducive to fast times. Nevertheless, Central Ohio State ran the mile relay in 3:11.9 for a record as Martin McGrady ran the fastest leg in 47.1. The 480-yard high hurdle relay record of 61.2 set by Michigan State last year was bettered with a 60.9 clocking despite Jones' absence.

Bob Steele, ordinarily MSU's number three high hurdler, won the 440-yard barriers the first time this event was added to the agenda in 53.0, and was close-up third in the highs as Paul Jones of the Detroit Varsity Club inched out MSU's Big 10 champ, Gene Washington, in 13.9. Oddly, the timers gave Washington 14.0 when he was only beaten in a leaning finish. The wind was over the limit, however.

Michigan State's 6'5" sophomore John Spain, who just became eligible, showed his class with a 1:50.7 leadoff in the distance medley and 1:49.8 in the two-mile event.

loading our equipment and luggage on the plane and checking our credentials. But they couldn't find our plane tickets.

"Going from one official to the other," Whitey said, "everything for the Striders was in order--except our tickets weren't there. We went down the line, to every official from the American Embassy on down. No one was able to, or would, do anything." At this point the 18-man American contingent was getting a little worried.

"Finally, about five minutes before the plane was to leave," Taylor went on, "I said to the airport official, 'Get our luggage and poles off of the plane.' But the Mexican official said, 'So sorry since it's too late.' We sat there in amazement as the plane took off with all of our possessions." Unfortunately, the story gets wackier as it goes along.

"Finally, after several hours of attempting to contact somebody who would be able to do something, we made contact with one man who was intelligent and competent. He couldn't do anything to help, he finally reported after several hours, but he did put the team up in a Tijuana hotel Friday night. That one intelligent official," said Taylor, "was Captain Ignacio de la Vega. So, instead of a two-day meet, we were forced into an all-day Sunday affair. They put the team on the same 1:45 p.m. flight to Mexico City Saturday afternoon as we were supposed to take Friday. And, led by Pennel's 17'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " vault, our boys won 13 out of 16 events with only four hours sleep."

Taylor, who under ordinary circumstances doesn't raise his voice beyond a pleasant speaking tone, was quite perturbed Sunday night when he first reached us, and this was before the Pennel incident. By Monday afternoon, the amiable track man had calmed down to a shudder and a groan at the thought of the chaos to come.

And then, about 5 p.m. Monday night, distanceman Bennel Fernee called to inform Taylor, who didn't make the trip from Tijuana to Mexico City, that Pennel was detained in Mexico City while the rest of the squad was put on a plane for Los Angeles.

"I couldn't believe it," said Pennel Monday night when he finally arrived in LA, "but my pole went on another plane to Dallas."

"The only competent official I found in Mexico--and he was extremely impressive and intelligent," Taylor summed up, "was Captain de la Vega. But for the one competent official I found, there were 90 that weren't. I shudder at the thought of '68. The summer Olympics no more belong in Mexico City than the winter games belong in Palm Springs. It certainly isn't going to be another Rome or Tokyo."

Pennel, when we asked whether he thought things would improve by Olympics time, said, "I don't know. They've only got two years. I just don't know."

An American Team Travels to Mexico

The dateline will read, "Mexico City, 1968," and the story, unless something drastic is done in the next 24 months, will read, "The '68 Olympiad here in Mexico City is the most disorganized form of chaos ever experienced by the world's athletes." The Mexican Olympic Games, in the opinion of Southern California Striders athletic director, Whitey Taylor, are currently shaping up as the most catastrophic chapter in the history of amateur sport.

Taylor, without making any prejudiced remarks against the Mexican people in general, still was hot under the collar Monday night after the disastrous four day weekend his Striders track club spent in Mexico. Taylor reached the epitome of disgust Monday night when he learned that star pole vaulter John Pennel, the top active vaulter in the world, was not allowed to leave Mexico City Monday afternoon with the rest of the 18-man squad, because somebody had stolen his tourist card.

Finally, through the efforts of one Professor Del Valli Alquicira, Pennel was allowed to leave the country Monday night at 6 p.m. (Mexico City time) after, in his own words, four of the most "unbelievably disorganized days I've ever spent." The whole unbelievable tale began last Friday afternoon in Tijuana, Mexico.

"Our instructions," the flabbergasted Taylor told us "were to report to the Tijuana airport Friday afternoon for a 1:45 p.m. flight to Mexico City where we were to compete in an invitational meet as guests of the Mexican track club. We were there at the appointed time for the trip. The airport authorities went about their business,
