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## Smith Unleashes Greatest Effort Ever: 19.5s

San Jose, Calif., May 7--Great Tommie Smith slipped into his fluid "Tommie-jet" gear during a 220-yard straightaway race, and the result was the greatest performance in the history of track and field. Greater than Randy Matson's 70'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ " or Ron Clarke's 27:39.4 10,000-meters, according to the Portuguese Scoring Tables.

Under perfect conditions and circumstances, the San Jose State junior raced to a 19.5 clocking for both 200-meters and 220-yards--a full half-second under the record first set by Dave Sime and later tied by Frank Budd. It marked the first time a world record has been broken in 1966, and it was the oldest record in the books. The timers clocked Smith at 200-meters 19.4, 19.5 and 19.6, and at 220-yards at 19.5, 19.5 and 19.6.

The Portuguese Scoring Tables converts straight 220 races into turn races by adding .475, which would mean his 220 turn time is 19.975--more than two-tenths below Henry Carr's 20.2 world turn record. This 19.975 turn time is rated as worth 1063 points, a fantastic 20 points more than Matson's 70'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ " is worth and 24 more than Clarke's 27:39.4!

Smith stumbled slightly out of the blocks but otherwise was out fast. Teammate Wayne Hermen was on his way in normal quick fashion and led Tommie for 70 to 80 yards, when Smith relaxed and barreled ahead. He won by about 10 yards from Hermen, who was timed in 20.5. The wind gauge read 4.02 mph, under the allowable limit.

Coach Bud Winter was certain Tommie was hot earlier in the day when he reeled off a 9.2 leg on the 440-yard relay and later a windy 9.3 100-yard dash. He did not long jump in this meet. The weather was ideal and the track was in perfect condition.

## Texas Southern's Upsets Scare Southern

Houston, Tex., May 7-8--James Hines, Arnaldo Bristol and John Hartfield of Texas Southern, plus some real surprises almost lost Southern University its second consecutive Southwestern Athletic Conference title in a meet delayed four days by rain which forced a rare Sunday final. Even with the delay the Saturday night prelims were held in a driving rainstorm which affected all competition though Hines' 9.6 and 21.7 plus 14.2s by Bristol and Roy Hicks and some easy sub-48 flat quarter-miles indicated top athletes were present.

One of the most outstanding marks was Hartfield's 7'1" in a downpour which raised his best by three-quarters of an inch and ranks him second only to Ron Tull in the US this year. The asphalt take-off was nearly underwater but it didn't affect the Tiger junior as he entered the competition at 6'4", cleared 6'6", passed at 6'7", and then made 6'8", 6'9", 6'10", 6'11", 7'0" and 7'1" without a miss. He failed at 7'1 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". It was a Texas Southern event as Roy Hicks and Curtis Crum took second and third at 6'6" each with two more men in the fifth and sixth spots.

Warm, sunny weather in the finals brought about the expected fast sprint races, but some of the winners were surprises and the times were somewhat tainted. Hines won the 100 and 220 in duels with Southern's George Anderson, 9.4 to 9.5 and 20.5 to 21.3. In both these races as well as the high hurdles won by Bristol in 13.7, the starter fired the gun almost before the runners had come to the set position. Willie Davenport and Hicks followed in the hurdles with 13.9 and 14.0.

Biggest surprise was the 440 where Southern qualified its mile relay team of Everett Mason, Anthony Gates, Robert Johnson

and Theron Lewis, and it was expected this group would sweep the first four spots over relative unknowns Albert Stinson of Arkansas AM&N and Thomas Miller of Alcorn. Instead, Stinson took an early lead and won easily in 46.3 over a tired looking Lewis who clocked 46.7 ahead of Miller's 46.9 and Gates' 47.2. Stinson's previous best was a reported 47.0 (though possibly a relay leg). This big upset plus the fact that Southern dropped the baton in the first exchange in the 440 relay made it look like Texas Southern had a chance to win the meet. George Hunt of TSU ran 1:50.1 to hold off fast closing Grambling frosh Lennox Yearwood (1:50.6). Hicks added a surprise win in the long jump with a lifetime best of 24'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " on his final effort. This pulled the Tigers even with two events to go but Southern's Elgy Sam won the 440 hurdles and its mile relay team, though looking tired, easily ran away with the event and the meet. Mason led off with a staggering 50.1, but Gates put the Jaguars back into the race with a 45.9 and it was all over as Johnson and Lewis ambled to a 3:10.1 with 47.6 and 47.5 clockings.

Southern won the meet with 92 points to 82 for Texas Southern. Prairie View, scoring heavily in the weights, had 54, with Arkansas AM&N 19, Alcorn A&M 18, Grambling 9 and Jackson State 8 following 100, Hines (Tex So) 9.4; 2. ## Kemp Races 1:49.4, 45.9 Relay Legs

Quantico, Va., May 6-7--A five-man team from Kentucky State College staged a commando raid on the 10th Marine Corps Schools Relays here this weekend and escaped with all three relays which they entered. Led by Jim Kemp, who won last year's NCAA 440 as a sophomore, Kentucky State qualified for the 880-yard relay on Friday with the fastest time of 1:26.3, and then won the three fastest finals on Saturday, the sprint medley in 3:21.1, the 880 in 1:24.3 and the feature mile relay in 3:10.2. The invaders ran Marshall Glover, Clarence Ray and Kemp in all three races, with Vernell Turner replacing Babe Bailey in the mile.

Villanova took the two-mile and distance medley relays in 2 7:28.2 and 9:53.8, with Fordham and Georgetown finishing second and third in both of them. Host team Quantico won four relays in the club and service division but couldn't match Kentucky State's times in the 880 and sprint medley, and in the only race in which they met head-to-head, the invitational mile relay, had to settle for second place with 3:10.8.

Although a number of meet and division records were broken in relay races, the best performances were produced in individual events. Ed Roberts, of North Carolina College and Trinidad, equaled the fastest legal 100 run this spring with a windless 9.3, followed closely by John Moon in 9.4. Roberts was also the reason for NCC's victory in the 440-yard relay, taking the baton a yard behind Morgan State and steaming into a four-yard margin at the tape.

Ricky Urbina, Georgetown junior, ran his best half-mile on Friday, beating the Germann twins in 1:50.9. George Germann came back on Saturday to win the mile in 4:06.1, defeating Bob Zieminski to avenge Friday's loss to Georgetown teammate Urbina.

Hurdler Leon Coleman of Winston-Salem won the intermediates on Friday in a fast 51.2, with Andy Bell of American U nosing out Quantico's Courtland Gray in identical 51.7s. In the highs, Pat Pomphrey of Tennessee finished strongly to beat Coleman and set a meet record of 13.7. Pomphrey's coach, Chuck Rohe, has great respect for his determination. "Pomphrey is probably the slowest

sprinter among this country's best hurdlers," Rohe said, "but he can give any of them a run for their money over the highs."

Mike Manley of Quantico and formerly of Wisconsin ran his best steeplechase, winning in 8:52.6, the best performance in the US this year (as Al Carius' 8:48.8 at the Kentucky Relays was found to be short a hurdle per lap). Manley went out to an early lead and had the race all for himself.

In the field, dependable Charlie Mays featured the Friday competition by winning the long jump for the fifth consecutive year with a meet record of 25'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Mays led the qualifiers with 25'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " but lost the lead to Bob Beamon, North Carolina A&T frosh, who did 25'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " on his penultimate leap. Mays came right back with his winning distance which Beamon could not match. In between jumps, Mays won a heat and placed fourth in a quarter-final in the 100. Beamon could do no better than second in his triple jump specialty, being beaten by Chris Mousiadis who reached 50'4". Frank Costello of Maryland won the high jump at 6'10" on fewer attempts, when Rutgers' Elijah Miller started at 6'4" while Costello entered at 6'6".

The four-mile relay which ended the first day's team races, was quite different. Here the Quantico Marines went out to an early lead with Bob Brouillet holding a 10 yard lead over Villanova's Charlie Messenger. Bill Clark, formerly of Notre Dame, extended this a little for Quantico, with Navy moving into second ahead of Villanova. Keith Forman ran a 4:10.5 mile as Quantico's third man and broke the race wide open, letting Mike Manley finish the race with an unpressed 4:16.2. Quantico's time of 16:56.0 has been beaten only by Kansas and Abilene Christian this spring. Georgetown, last week's Penn Relays winner, and Villanova were far behind in fifth and sixth.

Villanova came back on Saturday and ran the best two-mile relay in the East this year, doing 7:28.2 on the strength of Ian Hamilton's 1:50.6 and Dave Patrick's 1:50.8. Villanova beat Fordham by about 10 yards with Georgetown moving from fifth to third through Urbina's 1:50.5 anchor leg.

Kentucky State's performances in their three events were notable primarily for Jim Kemp's contributions. In the sprint medley, Kemp ran the the 880 anchor, receiving the baton about four-feet ahead of Villanova's Dave Patrick. After about 660-yards, Kemp and Patrick were even but Kemp pulled away to win by about seven yards. Kemp also ran a leg on the victorious 880-yard relay team, and wound up the day with a 45.9 anchor in the mile relay. The latter was the second fastest 440 leg in the meet, being beaten only by Kent Bernard's 45.5. Kemp was declared the meet's outstanding performer by the Games Committee.

## Texas Rallies, Matson in Seasonal Bests

Austin, Texas, May 6-7--Heralded locally as a test between Texas and favored Rice for the team title and a weight event show by a rapidly-rounding-into-shape Randy Matson, the Southwest Conference meet was just that and more--particularly in the way of top flight middle-distance running times.

The big headliner of course was Matson, who produced two seasonal bests of 66'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ " from 65'10 $\frac{1}{4}$ " and 197'11" from 191'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". But it was Preston Davis' performance in several events that helped Texas clinch the team title with unexpected points. Davis lowered his best 880 time to 1:48.9 from 1:50.2, and pushed defending champion Curtis May of Arkansas to third (4:09.7) in the mile as he tied 4:07.2 for second behind teammate Richard Romo's 4:05.9. It was in the decisive mile relay in which Davis came through with his best clutch performance. He was given the baton for the third carry in sixth place and brought Texas to fourth for an eventual 3:11.3 final behind Rice's 3:08.5. Texas won the meet from Rice, 58 to 55.

Perhaps the most significant team effort came in the usually dry three-mile where Richard Romo, Ken Sunderland and Brian Wocsey swept the first three places, Romo recording 14:32.0. SMU's Jim Bankhead edged Rice's Jim Ellington 46.4 to 46.5, for the nation fifth and seventh best quarter-mile times to date. The Rice frosh mile relay squad raced to the second best time ever, 3:09.7, by a freshman team, second only to Southern's 3:08.3 set last year.

## UCLA Tags USC First Time in 34 Tries

Los Angeles, Calif., May 7--UCLA ended years of frustration today by defeating cross-town rival Southern California for the first time ever in a dual meet. Thirty-three times the Trojans had taken the measure of the Bruins but today the well balanced squad from Westwood had all the best of it. The Bruins won 86 to 59, and UCLA Coach Jim Bush indulged himself in the luxury of resting Bob Day from the two-mile. The co-captain of the winners had won the mile in 4:00.2 and was ready to run the two-mile despite a slight foot injury but his services weren't needed. Day faces a big challenge in the Coliseum Relays' two-mile this coming weekend.

Bush was visibly elated at the win and his first comment was, "I am extremely proud of this team". It was a fairly formful meet as the Bruins went into a big lead early in the meet. When Ron Copeland upset an injured Paul Kerry and Earl McCullough in the highs and Bob Frey and Don Domansky went one-two in the following event, the 440, the flavor of the meet had decidedly turned in favor of UCLA. Frey and Domansky both established lifetime bests of 46.5 and 47.1, sixth and last place was timed in 47.8. The meet was held in perfect conditions before a crowd of 9971 and a local television audience.

The two top performances of the afternoon came in the accompanying freshman meet--and both by Trojans. Southern Cal's Jamaican freshman Lennox Miller set a new Coliseum record for the 220 around a full turn when he blazed a 20.6. He put Harold Busby of UCLA away by the time he hit the straight and built up a five yard lead. Busby regained two yards down the straight but Miller appeared to be coasting, the Bruin was given a generous 20.7 for second. Miller's mark ties the freshman record set by Bernie Rivers. Paul Wilson became the fourth 17-foot vaulter of the year when he cleared 17'1" on his first try for a national frosh and collegiate record. It stands equal second on the all-time list with the marks recorded by John Pennel, Bob Seagren and Sam Kirk; only Fred Hansen has done better. His final try at 17'4½" was very close to breaking the world mark of 17'4".

Dwight Middleton won both sprints for the varsity Trojans in 9.7 and 21.0. Dennis Carr was an easy winner in the 880, after being content to lay back behind Dennis Breckow's pace and outkick him down the finishing straight. In the mile, Day led all the way in 59.0, 1:57.8 and 2:58.5. Bruce Bess and John Link both came through with life-time bests to pick up second and third in 4:02.0 and 4:02.2. UCLA's Geoff Pyne was fourth in 4:04.2. Dick Selby of the Bruins set a new school record in the javelin with a mark of 247'11". The other field events went close to form, although the Bruins showed unexpected strength in the long jump and Trojan Doug Swartz had a lifetime best of 15'1" for a second in the pole vault. The triple jump resulted in a one-two-three finish for graduates of Foothill JC in northern California.

**Sidlo Most Impressive of All Javelinists**

by Peter Matthews

In that most inconsistent of all events, the javelin, Janusz Sidlo has compiled a most impressive collection of performances, lacking but one honor--an Olympic Gold Medal. He came closest in 1956 at Melbourne when he had all five throws better than Egil Danielson's second best throw. But Danielson set a world record with 281'2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" on his only good attempt. He again came close in 1960 when his first-round throw 279'4" was the year's longest, but could not better the throw in the finals, finishing eighth.

Sidlo won his national, Polish championship from 1951 to 1960 and placed second in 1962, '64 and '65. He garnered the European Championship in 1954 and '58. In his peak he had a fantastic competitive record: 1953-lost twice; 1954-lost to Walczak; 1955-undefeated; 1956-lost thrice (Danielson in Olympics; third to Danielson and Kopyto; third to Kopyto and Macquet, both in international competition); 1957-lost once when injured; 1958-lost once to Kopyto; 1959-lost once to Lievore; 1960-lost thrice; 1963-undefeated.
