## Nebiolo Upbeat On Cup

IAAF president Primo Nebiolo wasn't pleased with the U.S. team's performance at the World Cup, and noted that the big-name Chinese were also conspicuously absent, but was nonetheless very happy with the event's prospects.

"It's true, after the last edition in Havana, I had thought that we would cancel the World Cup, but today I can assure you there is no question of that," he said in London. "Note that 172 countries televised the event, and it was seen by tens of millions of people."

Nebiolo also said he wanted a "more international" GP Circuit, and said he expected Tokyo, New Delhi, Sydney and Johannesburg to join the ranks of big-time meets. "They will find their place in May to open the season," he said.

## A Braun-Drechsler Feud?

According to Gilles Navarro of *L'Équipe*, German heptathlete Sabine Braun wasn't all that thrilled with Heike Drechsler's big-time debut in the 7-eventer.

Braun, the '91 world champion, was slated to compete in Talence, but pulled out when the German press printed reports that Drechsler had received a \$30,000 check to ensure her participation.

Braun ended up taking Drechsler's place as the German team's long jumper at the World Cup.

Said Navarro, "Today Sabine must be lighting a candle for Heike to renounce a long jump/heptathlon double at Göteborg."

Such a double—one which Bobby Kersee wouldn't let JJK attempt in Stuttgart because the LJ final was the day before the hept started—will be relatively easy in Sweden. The LJ final is on August 6 and the multi doesn't start until August 9.

## Compassion For Druggees

"I'm concerned about the way track & field is being singled out by some sections of the press as a 'dirty sport' and dragged in the mud," British coach Brian Hooper told *Athletics Weekly* in the wake of the Modahl case.

He takes a more positive tack on the situation: "In my view, if athletics catches

and exposes drug offenders, it's no disgrace to the sport. It's a benefit. It shows we are prepared to expose cheats.

"We should also bear in mind that sporting drug offenders are just misguided people who have cheated. They have harmed no one but themselves. We may feel they have abused our trust and let us down, but they are hardly child molesters or mass murderers.

"Exposed drug offenders, such as Ben Johnson, have been vilified beyond logic or reason. I feel there is also a case for special counseling for these people. After all, our so-called caring society has counselors for rapists, murderers and heroin addicts."

## Chinese Stars Named

After maintaining a low profile since their record-breaking splurge late last year, the Chinese women are about to hit the scene again, reports correspondent Isao Sugawara.

## Back To de Coubertin

Kevan Gosper, the first vice president of the IOC, has called for a return to "basic Olympic ideals." Speaking to the IOC's Olympic Congress, Gosper was critical of the ever-bigger trend the Olympics is taking.

Lavish opening and closing ceremonies came in for particular attention from the 60-year-old Gosper, who anchored Australia's silver medal 4 x 4 in '56. "What about the courage to cry 'half' when entertainment begins to take over the mind and the body at an Olympic Games, notwithstanding the fact that it is an entertainment that attracts millions of television dollars for the betterment of world sport," he said.

"We need to avoid extravagant unrelated entertainment if we want people to aspire to and to remember an Olympic Games for what they are."

Gosper also took a shot at sponsors, who increasingly gobble up tickets and contribute to ever-higher prices.

"Are we going to face the fact that before long it may not be practical for all who wish to do so to attend an Olympic Games?" he asked. "Particularly the younger generation whose place in the stadium at the climax of the Olympic finals is closed off with the weight of VIP and corporate presence."

## Greater Voice For Athletes

Hurdle legend Edwin Moses, now a member of the IOC's athletes commission, gave a keynote speech at the Olympic Congress in which he urged a greater voice for athletes in Olympic affairs.

"The interests and welfare of the athlete should be the most important criteria for the choice of the host cities," he said. Moses also said athletes should have more say in the general decision-making processes of sport.

Lending support to Moses' plea was the IAAF's Primo Nebiolo, who said, "The athlete of the future is also the leader of the future, and the time has come for the international federations to offer new and better opportunities for athletes to be involved in the leadership of these governing bodies."
