## Fireworks At Convention

St. Louis, November 29–December 3—One of the most exciting national conventions in recent memory found Executive Director Ollan Cassell embattled on several counts.

Amid allegations he has been less than forthright in his handling of negotiations for the planned 5-meet televised indoor circuit in the upcoming season, Cassell first had to stave off a bid to unseat him as the organization's head man.

## Cassell Dodges Bullet

After an anti-Cassell faction on the organization's Executive Committee failed in a 12–8 vote (with 1 abstention and 1 absentee) to reverse a decision made in October to recommend renewal of Cassell's contract through 1997, the ExComm's vote had to be ratified by the Board Of Directors.

Cassell's opponents circulated an unsigned 26-page document titled "Time For A Change" to the BOD as that group gathered to vote.

Contained in the hastily prepared document were copies of correspondence and other papers intended to show among other things that Cassell had lied or twisted the truth in communications with the BOD and USATF members.

Heated debate ensued both at the 9-hour ExComm meeting and the next morning's BOD gathering, according to those present. When the dust cleared, the BOD (which has 100-plus members) voted 42–24 to renew Cassell's contract.

Prime among the charges levied by Cassell's opponents was that the executive director had told the BOD that Nike was signed on as a sponsor of the proposed televised indoor circuit when, in fact, the sportswear manufacturer still has not come to terms with Cassell and his co-negotiator Alvin Chriss (a representative of sports marketing giant and series partner IMG).

This fact would certainly have been a concern in the BOD's decision to approve up-front funding of TV series costs against hoped-for future sponsorship and TV commercial time sales. USATF's exposure in the television deal, judged by

some to be as high as \$1.2 million, places the governing body, with its annual budget of roughly \$8 million, in a position of significant financial risk. Monies for the outlay were reportedly diverted from the USATF investment fund with the BOD's approval.

Among those who vocally campaigned to oust Cassell were retired athletes Leo Williams, Nancy Ditz and Rose Monday (all ExComm members), and active distance runner PattiSue Plumer.

Former miler Craig Masback, now a TV announcer and lawyer, recently penned a set of recommendations on marketing the sport at the request of USATF President Larry Ellis. Masback acknowledges he was in contact with members of the anti-Cassell faction but denies charges from Cassell supporters that he coveted the executive director's position.

"I like my job," said Masback, whose marketing report suggested several others as possible replacements for Cassell, now in his 30th year as executive director of USATF and its predecessor, the AAU, following a career as a world-class sprinter.

## Cassell Retains IAAF Position

Cassell triumphed 286–75 over walker Alvia Gaskill in a bid for reelection as U.S. representative to the IAAF Council, of which he is a vice president.

That a relative unknown such as Gaskill should receive so much support was widely viewed as a protest vote against Cassell.

Larry Ellis was reelected by acclaim as USATF president for another 2-year term. Reelected to 2-year USATF vice presidential terms were walk official Darlene Hickman, former 400 Olympian Herman Frazier and longtime USATF activist Pat Rico.

## Foreigners Out Of Indoor

Politically bruised but still alive, and acknowledging "we have some things that need to be corrected," Cassell did suffer a setback later in the week. He wanted to table a motion to ban foreigners from the USATF Indoor Champs starting in '97.

Cassell argued that top foreign com-

petitors add value to the championships, which are the final stop on the indoor GP circuit currently sponsored by Mobil. Banning them, he said, could hamper negotiations for indoor circuit sponsorships when Mobil's contract expires after the '96 season.

The elite competitors of the Athletes Advisory Committee, however, criticized the payment of appearance fees to foreigners when no Americans are paid to attend the championships and threw their weight solidly behind the ban, which was approved.

"An all-American indoor championships," said triple jump star Mike Conley, "will live and die on the success of the [televised] indoor circuit. If we put on a good show, we'll get plenty of sponsors. If we get the sponsors, then we can do whatever we want."

While debating the foreigner ban, Cassell took the unprecedented step of agreeing to make two athletes, one man and one woman, privy to future negotiations for indoor GP sponsorship.

## USTCA Meetings

St. Louis, December 2–3—Concurrent with the USATF Convention, coaches gathered for the U.S. Track Coaches Association (USTCA) meetings.

## Regional Qualifying In Doubt

NCAA Div. I coaches present at last year's USTCA meetings overwhelmingly approved the concept of qualifying to the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships through regional meets. Now, with a detailed plan—not just a concept—on the table, the idea appears to face an uphill battle for approval.

The coaches discussed and approved polling all of their peers on a specific scheme that would partially replace the current system of performance-based filling of fields, essentially eliminating provisional qualifying to the nationals.

Opponents of the plan appeared to be nearly as numerous as proponents, however, and an NCAA rule requiring 75% participation in the poll before any action is taken makes it possible for an opposi-

tion bloc of just over 25% of Div. I member schools to defeat the plan by simply declining to vote, even if a majority approves the measure.

In response to a vow by Div. I Committee President Frank Gagliano of Georgetown that regional representatives would work hard to pressure all coaches to vote, one opponent muttered, "Sounds like a communist kind of thing to me."

Even many coaches who favor regional qualifying oppose the particular plan in question, devised by a subcommittee headed by Boston U's Pete Schuder.

Dissension on the issue runs so deep that, to cite one illustrative example, North Carolina head Dennis Craddock and assistant Dennis Mitchell are prime movers behind the idea, while another Carolina assistant, Curtis Frye, voted against moving ahead. All member coaches were eligible to vote on whether or not to create the poll, but the actual vote itself will be institutionally based.

## Wrestling Move Backed

The coaches also voted to donate \$1000 to aid a fight by the National Wrestling Coaches Assoc. against the elimination of men's collegiate sports programs for the purpose of achieving gender equity.

Acting on the recommendation of a minority and gender-equity report by Cal Poly San Luis Obispo coach Brooks Johnson, the USTCA members present also voted to seek pro bono legal counsel to aid in the filing of a friend-of-the-court brief at a hearing the wrestling coaches group will have before the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights. The Office of Civil Rights is the federal agency that oversees enforcement of the Title IX gender equity statute.

The wrestling coaches group maintains that as a gender-blind statute, Title IX should no more discriminate against men's programs than against women's, although previous Office of Civil Rights decisions have approved the cutting of men's sports programs to achieve gender equity in terms of participation numbers and financial outlay.

Johnson, speaking before the Div. I coaches group within the USTCA, promoted this same view, arguing, "Title IX is not the enemy. In fact, the battle against program cuts and the fight for gender equity are kissing cousins because they're both about fairness."

## IAF Awards To Morceli, JJK

Coca-Cola has come on board as a major player in the track & field sponsorship

game. The soft drink bottler has linked up with the International Athletic Foundation (IAF) in sponsoring the Monaco-based group's Annual Gala and its selection of Athletes Of The Year.

The IAF, an arm of the IAAF, does a broad-spectrum spreading of ballots, and the result is voting which rarely reflects that of the T&FN panel. The IAF voters tend to give more credence to one spectacular performance than to a whole season of high quality. We're not saying we're right and they're wrong, just that things are viewed differently.

Still, the IAF did name the same No. 1 man as we did, and on the women's side... sorry—what we did is still privileged information (but loyal TN readers will know before those who get only the magazine).

## Women's AOY Teaser

While we can't tell you quite yet who our Women's Athlete Of The Year is, we can tantalize you with some fascinating facts about the balloting, which is 99% complete. One thing is clear, it's the most bizarre ballot we've ever had to deal with:

- The No. 2 person will have more votes in places 1 and 2 than the winner.
- The No. 3 person will be the first ever to receive the most No.1 votes and end up only No. 3.
- Conversely, the AOY will be the first winner (man or woman) to only receive the fourth-highest total of votes for No. 1.
- One athlete will receive votes in each position 1-10, and three others will score in 9 of 10.

## One Strike And You're Out

While there are those who have suggested that drug penalties might work better if they were lightened, British sprinter Linford Christie is taking a very hard line on the subject.

"They can hang them for all I care," said the outspoken Christie in November, talking to an international TV audience about people who get nailed on doping offenses.

"The Home Secretary says that people who peddle steroids should be sent to prison," noted Christie. "It is my view that if you are going to sentence a steroids

pusher, then why not also give the same sentence to a taker?"

Christie doesn't believe in second chances either, saying, "If you take part in the sport and you take drugs you should be banned for life. They shouldn't wait for a second offense."

## Dong To Auction Medal

The Chinese women in general had low-key seasons in 1994, but defending world 1500 champ Liu Dong, a 4:00.50 performer, had an apparently nonexistent one.

After a serious falling-out with fiery coach Ma Junren (T&FN, March) over such matters as whether or not she would be allowed to date, Liu didn't show up in major '94 competitions.

She says she's eager to prepare for the big '95 and '96 seasons, but to finance her training, she told the Chinese news agency Xinhua, she will have to auction off her Stuttgart gold medal.

"Though the gold medal symbolizes what an athlete can achieve in her career, intensive training for future events is more important," the 21-year-old Liu said.

## Rico Leaves Indoor Meet

After being in charge of the indoor nationals since 1977, New Yorker Heliodoro Rico has stepped down from the meet director position for the 1995 USATF Indoor Championships.

USATF Executive Director Ollan Cassell had high praise for Rico, saying he had treated the position "as if it were a full-time, year-round job," and said he made the meet's transition to Atlanta from its longtime home in Madison Square Garden "look easy."

Duffy Mahoney, USATF's director of operations, will take over as meet director, with Phil Henson (competition manager for '96 Olympic track) assisting him as technical director.

## GP Schedule Modified

The IAAF Council has ratified the 1995 Grand Prix schedule, and there are several amendments over the preliminary one we listed in the October 26 newsletter.

São Paulo is now confirmed as May 14 (not the optional 13th); Cologne moves from August 27 to August 18; Berlin moves from September 5 to September 1. At the GP II level, Rieti moves from August 20 to September 5.
