Lewis Wants Change Too

Taking a cue from Michael Johnson's ongoing efforts to afford himself a better opportunity for an Olympic 200/400 double, Carl Lewis's camp has made its own request for changes in the Atlanta schedule.

Santa-Monica TC manager Joe Douglas wrote to the IAAF in early October, saying, "If the precedent of scheduling changes is in fact being set, I respectfully request that [Lewis's] opportunity to compete in all of his events be taken into consideration.

"As the schedule stands now, the 200m and long jump are to take place simultaneously. I would request that the 100, 200 and long jump be separated."

Lewis, of course, won the 100, 200 and LJ in the '84 Games; he repeated in the century and jump in '88, but was edged in the 200 by teammate Joe DeLoach. He hasn't tried the triple in national competition since the '92 Trials, when he was ill, and placed 2nd in the long jump, 4th in the 100 and 6th in the 200.

IAAF head Primo Nebiolo responded, "We understand that a great athlete wants the most favorable timetable to do his events. For the time being, we don't know what will become of this, or what decisions will be made."

The grapevine has long said that the IAAF and ACOG are amenable to making changes for Johnson; whether or not they'll afford the 34-year-old Lewis a similar option remains to be seen.

Money Woes In Sweden

Expectations for handsome profits from the World Championships have failed to materialize, plunging Sweden's track federation into a major financial crisis.

Some premeet profit estimates reached as high as \$10 million. But after mid-October meetings, Göteborg organizers say their return may reach only about \$2 million at best.

The main money-eating culprits were some \$10 million for the athletes' village and another \$5 million to expand one side of the stands in Ullevi Stadium.

The expansion may not have been needed, as the meet basically never sold out, probably due to high ticket prices. Göteborg's tariff was the most expensive of the five editions of the Worlds (T&FN, August '94), nearly double

Stuttgart's prices.

Program sales were expected to generate about \$100,000 in profit, but actually cost some \$800,000. And air conditioning for tents in the sponsors' village was \$200,000 more expensive than budgeted.

Federation president Bernt Groen resigned over the financial fiasco, which could profoundly impact Swedish athletes preparing for Atlanta.

Said vice-president Bengt Westerberg, "We will have to cut costs for the coming year by about \$1 million." Noted veteran hurdler Sven Nylander, the athlete rep at the meetings, "It should not be possible to stage a Worlds without making a profit. We athletes can't accept that [the federation] will drop all support to us. There will be protests."

Ricoh Tour On Again

Pleased with the success of the inaugural version last indoor season, Ricoh will again be sponsoring a 4-meet prize series during the '96 European undercover campaign.

The same quartet of meets (Stuttgart, Germany; Birmingham, England; Liévin, France; Stockholm, Sweden) will comprise the series, for which the total prize money has been raised to \$180,000.

The overall winners in the six events to be covered this time out (men's 200, 1000, 60H, high jump; women's 1000, triple jump) will each win \$25,000. Runners-up will earn \$5000 apiece.

Last year's winners (in different events) were Linford Christie, Darnell Hall, Moses Kiptanui, Yoelbi Quesada, Irina Privalova and Ellen van Langen.

Jackson Fights Federation

Colin Jackson claims he will boycott all '96 meets organized by the British Athletic Federation. The move by the star hurdler came even after a face-to-face meeting in early October with BAF chair Peter Radford.

Relations between Jackson and the federation have been chilly ever since this summer, when he was required to "show form" before being considered for the WC team. In the process, he ended up injured and didn't run in Sweden.

Jackson told correspondent Phil Minshull, "I have made up my mind. After the way

Radford spoke to me, lecturing me like a schoolboy and virtually accusing me of lying, I'll have nothing more to do with him or his meets."

Jackson added his '96 plans include one meet organized in Wales, other meets in Europe and the AAA Championships, which will be Britain's Olympic trial meet.

Radford expressed surprise at Jackson's comments, claiming recent talks between them had appeared to iron out the problems.

Jackson stressed that his decision was independent of the as-yet-unresolved feud between the BAF and his teammates and business partners, Linford Christie and John Regis, over appearance fees at domestic meets.

Support For 2-Year Bans

Even though the IAAF Congress voted to keep its major drug-suspension penalty at 4 years, rather than reducing it to 2, the issue is not a dead one. No less a figure than Prince Alexandre de Merode, chair of the IOC's medical commission, is in favor of the lesser penalty.

Saying that 4-year bans are too harsh, and impossible to defend in court in some countries, de Merode has issued a formal proposal to the IOC that rules be changed to call for a "maximum of 2 years," instead of a "minimum of 2 years" for a first-time offense. The IOC is eager to get all federations operating under the same set of rules.

Meanwhile, the USOC now says that its across-the-board plan to have surprise testing in all sports under its umbrella probably won't get off the ground until after Atlanta.

"We need to have an agreement that will have credibility and authenticity, so people won't say we just catch the dumb ones," said executive director Dick Schultz, in announcing that "minor irritants to athletes," were holding up implementation of the plan.

For its part, the IAAF has announced that its program of no-notice testing will rise from 1200 to 1500 samples next year. Arne Ljungqvist, head of the IAAF's doping commission, said a German proposal is being considered that would require all athletes be tested in an out-of-competition setting before being allowed into the Games. Ljungqvist said 70% of Göteborg's medalists had been randomly tested before competing in the WC.
