Hines: "Is Charlie Ready For Me?"

Modesto, Calif., May 27--Asked if he were ready for Charlie Greene, Jim Hines answered with a confident query, "Is Charlie ready for me?" And with that, Hines, a recent claimant to the previously two-man held 9.1 century world mark, took the California Relays 100-meter lead at the three-quarter post, held off a diving Greene and completed his coup d'etat as he gained a one-fifth slice of the 10.0 world standard that has escaped Charlie. It was the Texas Southern junior's first triumph over the Nebraska senior in seven short sprint starts outdoors.

The emphasis was on speed at this Tom Moore directed meet which traditionally budgets more money for the sake of bringing in more athletes than any other invitational in the world. And once again a virtual unknown produced a startling result--and in the case of Oregon State frosh Willie Turner it was two promising sprint finishes.

Conditions were virtually perfect for the 100-meters, as the wind averaged right at the maximum allowable of 2.0 mps/4.73 mph at their backs, the sun still shone before nightfall, the track was fresh and fast, and the field included nearly all of the world's finest short sprinters. Predictably, Greene was out ahead of the field but was overhauled by Harry Jerome at 25 meters. Menzies Campbell and Edwin Roberts were distinctly behind the leaders. And at this point, Willie Turner wasn't faring much better after a start he claimed was somewhat mediocre. With 10 superb speedsters running in nine lanes when Turner had been inadvertently left out of the line-up, the scene from the stands was frantic as the athletes shifted positions continuously. Hines, rated the second best furlong dashman in the world last year by T&FN, put into effect his superior stamina and stretch finish as he moved past the again leading Greene. Greene wasn't about to yield his first legitimate outdoor loss since the 1964 Olympic Semi-Trials. He actually appeared to gain on Hines in the last few meters and then he tried to outlean Hines but eventually crashed to the ground. He came up with skinned knees and hands and a dusty jersey but without first place--or even second place.

Second place had gone to an orange and black clad blur in lane one, named Willie Turner, who certainly moved quicker than anyone in the final 25 meters as he pulled from about sixth to a runner-up 10.0 that probably won't get him world or American record credit (or collegiate recognition since freshmen don't qualify) since there weren't three watches on him but may entitle him to the frosh mark.

As if his first achievement wasn't convincing, the 5'11", 167-lb., 18-year-old, second semester frosh from Yakima, Wash., actually gave Tommie Smith a run for the tape in the 220 and pinned his second straight third place finish on Greene. Smith enjoyed one of his best starts but he seemed to give up most of the special advantage with a slower than usual turn. Coming off the bend, Greene was leading by a yard with Turner, like Smith not particularly a good starter or turn runner, coming on with speed to burn. It never really seemed that Smith was in jeopardy, but gutty Charlie--who is not what you would call fond of this longer dash in spite of a 46.5 quarter-mile relay split--was determined to make a creditable showing here. Greene suffered a leg spasm near the end and fell at the chalk line trying to nip the impressively fast-closing Turner but missed his target, 20.6 to 20.4 to 20.3--all aided by a 6.0 mph wind.

Who is Willie Turner? Who is this athlete who equals a world record in his first major outdoor race? Willie was a two-time Washington state prep champ who has long been compared by locals to Greene, another product of this state, with times of 9.5 windy and 21.3 for the turn. Unlike Charlie, he has been relatively injury free. He enrolled at Yakima JC last fall but transferred to Corvallis because a quirk in the JC transfer rule permits spring frosh JC transfers to compete in the NCAA championship meet three years running instead of sitting out a year. He posted quick indoor times of 7.0 and 31.6 for 300-yards. This spring, he already was credited with legal clockings of 9.4 and 20.8 turn as well as a questionable 9.1 and a windy 20.6 turn. His race in Modesto left little question as to his mettle as a fast AND competitive sprinter. Often athletes produce world record efforts in new events but rarely in their first big-time race. Of

course, conditions were optimum here and it may be a time before he matches his times again--for now the pressure will be on. Says coach Berny Wagner; "He has great confidence. He doesn't think anyone can beat him. Once we get his start ironed out, I don't see that anything will stop him but I just can't label him with any goals now. I didn't expect this sort of thing this soon, that's for sure. He's a good one, though."

The same field plus South Africa's Paul Nash will be at Compton. In addition, Hines will also race Smith over 220-yards--a confrontation which he says he can win. He was held out of the longer sprint here because of relay duties. But here Texas Southern wasn't so successful as Hines' anchor in the 440 relay couldn't overtake William Miller's 12 yard advantage and his remarkable 20.1 lead-off leg in the 880 relay wasn't enough to prevent Southern from winning both, in 39.7 to 39.9 and 1:22.6 to 1:22.9. Southern, despite more than four weeks inactivity due to lack of funds to travel, combined nearly perfect passing in both go-arounds to come up with the fast times that still fell short of coach Dick Hill's predictions. Gusty winds which reached between 12 and 15 mph probably played a significant role in adding tenths to most of the oval races.

It's difficult to evaluate which event should have received top billing but the mile relay wouldn't rank far behind any other favorite. The event lost some of its glamour, however, when San Jose State was forced to withdraw after Ken Shackelford pulled up lame in the open 440. The pace was never exceptionally swift but it was still close down the backstretch of the third lap when the order was Southern, Rice, Arkansas AM&N and the Houston Striders--with Prairie View A&M's Thurman Boggess moving up rapidly to challenge for second only to fall back around the turn. In the homestretch, Rice's Dale Bernauer moved into the lead with a 46.1 but anchorman Conl Brown found Southern's Anthony Gates ahead as five teams had a chance for victory. Brown kicked hard to win with a 46.4 split and a 3:07.1 over-all as John Carlos brought the Houston Striders home in 3:08.1. Carlos, a frosh at East Texas State, had the fastest 440 of 45.7 in his fifth race of the evening. Earlier, he had won a heat and the final of the open 100-yards in 9.5 and 9.4, logged a strong second leg on the 440 relay and anchored his 880 baton group.

Most agreed that the high hurdle field missed only Earl McCullough and Eddy Ottoz from completing the finest collection available. The battle for first was a three-way tussle among fast-starting Willie Davenport, Richmond Flowers who rode his shoulder and resurging Blaine Lindgren. Not until the last hurdle did it become a four-way battle with Ron Copeland coming on so strong that it almost appeared he might have won. All four were credited with 13.5 marks, aided by a 7.4 mph breeze, with Davenport outlasting Flowers, followed by Copeland and Lindgren, then at 13.6 but never significant contenders were Arnaldo Bristol and Larry Livers.

The wind, which has favored discus throwers at Mt. SAC at West Coast Relays, was present once again and contributed generously to the fine marks. Only Al Oerter, with a bad case of poison oak, and George Puce, out for the year with four broken vertebrae from a motorcycle accident on Monday, and Randy Matson, resting before the big meets, were missing. All four of the 200-footers easily threw over 200-feet here and finished in the top four, as Czech vik Danek was consistently over the barrier with a 209'4" best. Unfortunately, this year series weren't measured in the discus, javelot or hammer. Rink Babka lofted the discus an impressive 207'1" in only his second meet of the year. Jay Silvester and Cary Carlsen totally smashed the best-ever third and fourth place finishes with 205'4" and 205'2"--seasonal best for Silvester and a career best of 5'1" for Carlsen over his West Coast Relays mark.

The two-mile and half-mile produced surprise winners by inconsistent performers who achieved performances many have long thought well within their capabilities. Ron Larrieu, angered at being dropped by Mihaly Igloi following a request for a week's vacation, wanted to beat Tracy Smith with the worst vengeance over the two-mile race here. With Smith and Lou Scott sharing the pacing chores for the first seven laps, Larrieu was content to hang back as Scott built up a six yard lead at the gun lap. With 250 to go, Larrieu scooted around quick-pacing John Lawson and fading Scott to kick a 58.5 last lap for an 8:32.0 clocking to become the equal 10th

in history with a career best by eight full seconds. Lawson, whose speed has improved this year, and Scott, who had tailed off in May after an early good season, also lowered their bests to rank ahead of Gerry Lindgren and Bob Day. Lawson's 8:33.8 ranks him seventh in US history and improved his outdoor best by 15.0 seconds, while Scott's third place finish in 8:35.2 puts him eighth in the US and knocked 6.2 seconds off his previous low. Smith, who Igloi claimed will be ready for a world record over two-miles by San Diego (June 10), slipped in the last 660 to finish fourth in a still creditable 8:36.2. Gaston Roelants never really was in the race as he took fifth in 8:38.4, just off his best. Texas Western freshman Kerry Pearce placed sixth in 8:46.8, 14.2 seconds below his best. George Scott, one of a number of New Mexico athletes piqued by having to travel the day of the meet, dropped out after six laps. One athlete missed the plane and others were forced to hitch-hike from San Francisco when they were found to be too young to rent a car... and missed their events.

Dave Buck forced the half-mile pace with a 52.9 first quarter with an impressive field close at his heels. Coming off the final curve, Buck had dropped back and it was a close tussle as Terry Thompson was inside and just about to fade, Dennis Carr was abreast full of run and Bill Crothers had the momentum going after moving up from fifth at the 660. But it was Carr who poured it on down the stretch to win comfortably in a best by one-tenth of 1:47.7. Crothers, whose only other race this year was 1:52.3 last week, clocked 1:47.9. John Perry overtook Thompson, 1:48.1 to 1:48.5. Seventh was 1:49.4.

The long jump and triple jump went, as expected, to Ralph Boston and Art Walker with splendid windy efforts. Boston, for whom this evening's meet was dedicated, started off with a windy 27'2½" that raised expectations. But, perhaps still unsettled from the new Tartan runways that caused him to move his step back 7½ feet, he could muster only a 26'8" (legal wind) next best. Bob Beamon was second at 26'8" on his last jump that was aided by only 4.9 mph. He had a legal best-of-life 26'7¼" on his fifth effort to move into eighth on the all-time world list. Walker compiled four jumps over 52-feet, his winning leap a 54'1" windy mark and his best legal mark a 52'4½" for his fourth best jump. Charlie Craig's last effort of 53'3½" was ok.

Briefly, some of the other highlights: Lee Evans assumed the lead over a good but little know quarter-mile field as he pushed to his third fastest one-lap clocking, a 45.6 for 440-yards. Dave Bailey passed Ed Dean on the last lap of the mile to pull away for a 4:01.1 win as Dean's 4:02.3 was a best-ever. Ron Whitney remained unbeaten in the 440 hurdles as he clocked 50.4. Bob Seagren outlasted Dick Railsback as both soared over 17'1". The next four all went 16'6½" for the highest fifth and sixth place finishes. Oregon brought four 4:00.1 or faster milers hoping to break its own 1962 world four-mile relay standard of 16:09.0 but strong winds limited the effort to the fourth fastest time of 16:25.4. Larry Kelly's 1:47.4 gave Tennessee the sprint medley relay victory in 3:18.5. In his first meet since his tonsilectomy, Ed Burke managed 211'8" with the hammer but fouled on his next five efforts "because I was trying too hard for 235-feet."

Patrick, Hall Pace Villanova at IC4A

Villanova, Pa., May 27--Dave Patrick and Erv Hall led Villanova to an easy team victory in the 91st--and one of the most lack-luster--IC4A outdoor championships. Injuries and exams kept more than one-third of the outstanding competitors from appearing, including Maryland's Ed Marks, whose prospective nine or 10 points in the long and triple jumps might have made the team contest close.

Patrick, who has had colds and/or tonsil trouble all spring, passed up an attempt at a mile/880 double to concentrate on the mile. He won easily in 4:04.9, spinning a 58.0 final quarter for a 15-yard edge on teammate Frank Murphy. Patrick said, "I think I could have run around 4-minutes if I'd had to. but my chest still hurts and I can't take a real deep breath."

Hall's 14.1, run into a headwind, was probably the best performance of the meet. Although hampered by a slight hamstringing pull and a poor start, the Villanova soph pulled away over the last four barriers to win by two yards.

The best field was in the 880, where two 1:52.0s and a 1:52.1 didn't make the final. It was the best race, too, with Rick Urbina, Bob Zieminski and Brian Hernon staging a hot fight over the final lap after a 57-plus first 440. Urbina pulled away in the stretch to win in 1:50.0 by five yards from Hernon, with Zieminski another two back.
