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## Great NCAA Topped by Swift Sprinting

Provo, Utah, June 15, 16, 17--Speed and more speed was the keynote of a highly successful NCAA championship meet that saw favored University of Southern California annex its 24th and one of its easier wins.

King-sized Randy Matson and throw-back-sized Gerry Lindgren annexed two victories each for the second year in a row. Paul Wilson vaulted 17'4" but still remained only the second best USC sophomore as teammate Bob Seagren claimed the win by also clearing 17'4". And there was spirited competition throughout.

But the focus of attention was on the speed merchants. The rubber-asphalt track proved as fast as any in history and some of the finest dashmen ever took full advantage of it. Charlie Greene, Tommie Smith, Lennox Miller, Earl McCullough and Richmond Flowers were nothing less than great, but the most memorable impression was left by the fantastic USC 440 relay quartet.

Earl McCullough, Fred Kuller and O. J. Simpson poured it on all the way, building an unbelievable lead, and when Miller flew down the final straight a good 20 yards ahead you knew the time had to be extraordinary. It was. The stop watches read 38.6. Just a year ago the new world mark was a full second slower and SC's 39.0 of last week was thought to be the ultimate--by all except the Trojans. Now the three sophs and one junior (McCullough) feel they can go faster as the last handoff was two or three tenths less than perfection.

It was the seventh race in three days for Miller and all of them were hyper-fast. The Jamaican jet ran 9.2, 9.3 and 9.3 in the 100 and 20.5, 20.4 and 20.4 in the 220. His 9.2 and 20.5 on Thursday constitute the second best one-day sprint double. But Miller failed to win an individual title.

He lost the century crown to Charlie Greene who was at his greatest. Although NCAA titlist for the last two years, Greene had never bettered 9.3 and his best for 1967 was an unimpressive 9.5. But Charlie runs to win, and he does it exceedingly well. This time he faced competition, both from Miller and from Jim Hines, who wasn't in the meet but who licked Greene in their last outing and who says he will take the Nebraskan in the AAU.

Charlie responded to the challenge magnificently. He told friends he might run 9.1 in the trials, and that he did, equalling the global mark of immortal Bob Hayes. Afterwards, Greene confessed he wasn't all out and talked about a nine flat or even an 8.9 run. But in the semis he got a poor start and ran only to win, clocking 9.4. Later that same Friday night came the showdown with Miller. Greene was off well and enjoyed a two foot lead in the early going. But at 70 yards Miller was closing. He cut the lead to less than a foot and Miller and the crowd expected a tight finish. Charlie, who has his own way of doing things, disappointed them. Shifting gears, a tactic he always talks about but seldom has to use, Greene slid away from the still flying Miller. At the finish he was eleven-hundredths, or nearly four feet ahead. The time was 9.2 but Charlie said it should be faster as the run felt quicker than his 9.1.

Miller lost the curved furlong to Tommie Smith, who owned the event until Hines whipped him in the Compton meet. But Tommie started back with his 20.1 at Sacramento and arrived here with three 20.2 times in as many races. As if to prove his versatility, the San Jose State senior did it three different ways. In the trials, shortly after Greene's 9.1, Smith got one of his better starts and flew the first 80 or 100 yards, much faster than usual. But he hung a little in the stretch. In the semi he ran the curve a little harder than usual, but slower than in the first 20.2. And in the final, facing the challenge of Miller, Tommie reverted to his slow start-fast finish style and came from behind. Miller is a great young soph, probably at his best in the 220, but as yet he is not a match for Smith at his peak. Smith's 20.2s constituted meet records.

Speedsters also accounted for meet marks in the high hurdles and mile relay. Running against a wind, McCullough and Rich Flowers both had 13.4s. Flowers, in fact, had a pair of them but it was McCullough who won the gold. They each ran 13.6 in the

heats while Flowers claimed the meet record with a 13.4 semi as Earl the Pearl, as he is known in the California southland, was running 13.5. Defending champ Ron Copeland of UCLA was a threat to both, but he blew his chances with a bad start in the final. And it was at the start that McCullough won. Always a quick reactor who picks up a number of false starts by trying to guess the gun, Earl hit this one just right and was never headed. He had about a yard on Flowers, but the Tennessee star never lost his cool and went to work. He gained only a little until near the end and in the run for the tape he made up a lot of ground. But it was too late and McCullough was the winner, in 13.4, by three-hundredths or one foot. Flowers claimed his second 13.4 as Copeland was beaten into the number four spot by Erv Hall of Villanova.

The mile relay record went, in a great race, to Iowa with a 3:06.8 win over Rice, 3:07.2. Mike Mondane, who had run well in a highly competitive quarter, anchored in 46.2 for the winners. But the fastest runs of the race were 45.6 legs by Bill Bruckel, who brought surprising Cornell into third, and by Copeland, who got UCLA into fifth as Cornell, California and UCLA all ran 3:08.0.

No records fell in the 440 but there was some fine running. Emmett Taylor of Ohio University was the winner in the biggest surprise of the meet and he didn't wait long to start his surprise. He ripped off a 45.9 trial run, did 46.0 in the semi-final, and got another 45.9 in the final. His victory was all the more notable as it came from the tight inside lane and he needed every bit of his speed and guts to beat off Steve Carson of Iowa State who also ran 45.9. Carson had trials of 46.4 and 46.2 while Mondane, who was a close third in 46.0, had run 46.3 and 45.9 before the final.

One of the most impressive bits of speed came from Jim Ryun. Content to let others set a pace which lagged to a schoolboy 3:10.9, the incomparable Kansan waited until the seventh furlong post to make his move. Then he went into an all-out sprint action to break the race wide-open. The next 100 yards were covered in 9.9-seconds and the final 120, from the 1500 post, in 14.0, which is the quickest finish on record. Jim's final go-round was 52.4 and the last 220 23.0, although Ryun thought the 220 clocking should be faster. Roscoe Divine of Oregon tried to match Ryun's blazing burst but had no chance although he successfully left the rest of the pack far behind. Divine faded some in the stretch and a fast closing Sam Bair got to within a half-second as Ryun clocked 4:03.5. Divine 4:06.2 and Bair 4:06.7.

Southern California won the meet with its sprinters, scoring 41 of its 84 points by members of the relay team. The relay team earned 10 points as did McCullough, while Miller picked up 16, Kuller four for fourth in the 100, and Simpson one for sixth for the pre-season and pre-meet favored Trojans. The vaulters contributed 18 points, Gary Carlsen was second in the discus, Dennis Carr and Dave Buck ran second and sixth in the 880, Geoff Vanderstock was third in the intermediates, the mile relay team picked up a sixth, and Paul Kerry, the 1965 hurdle champ who has been beset with injuries, had his best race in two years to finish sixth in the highs.

Oregon was a solid second with 40 points as defender UCLA finished third with 27, just ahead of host Brigham Young (26), New Mexico (24), Tennessee (24), Iowa (22), Southern Illinois (22), Washington State (21), Kansas (20) and Texas A&M (20). UCLA hopes, high at the start of the season, were shattered when they lost most of their sprint strength before the meet and what was left of it in the meet, when Harold Busby pulled up lame and a makeshift 440 relay team lost the baton.

Matson, who likes neither the cool weather which prevailed nor the big fields which allow a competitor to cool off between turns had no trouble to double. His 67'9½" put was a meet record, well ahead of potential troublemaker Neal Steinhauer's 64'2". The discus was a little more difficult but challenger Carlsen came up with three fouls and a best of 186'4". Randy topped that three times and won with 190'4".

Lindgren had no chance for records in the 4500 foot altitude but he completely dominated first the six-mile and then the three. He pulled away from Oscar Moore of Southern Illinois well before the end of both races, winning in 28:44.0 and 13:47.8. Moore was



second in the longer go but fourth in the three-miler. Glenn Ogden, the bespectacled 8:46 two-miler from Missouri, surprised with a fine 13:58.6 for second as George Scott of New Mexico outkicked Moore for the third.

The vaulting was outstanding even though it turned into a dual meet between USC and UCLA. Rick Sloan of UCLA had himself a big night, alternating between the vault and high jump pits. He jumped 6'9" and then had a personal best of 16'8" which was good only for fourth. Teammate Dick Railsback was the next to go, clearing 17'0, well above Brian Sternberg's 16'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ " meet mark, but getting third. The remaining battle was between Seagren and Wilson. They matched heights right up the line, passing 15'0", 15'6", and 16'4" and clearing 16'0", 16'8", 17'0" and 17'4". But Seagren was in command all the way, vaulting first and having no misses as Wilson failed once at each of the four heights he made. Wilson, who missed most of the season with injuries, had to go higher than Seagren to win and he almost did it. His third try at a world record 17'8" was close and better than any of Seagren's tries.

One other meet record fell. That was the triple jump where long striding, slow moving Art Baxter of New Mexico won handily. He had three of the six jumps over 50-feet, his best being 52'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". The other trio of 50-footers went to surprising Scott Etnyre of Utah who was second with 51'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

The one real upset of the meet took place in the high jump where favored Ed Caruthers of Arizona lost his first meet of the year. Ed cleared a good 7'1" but he had two misses on the way up while soph Steve Brown of Idaho had no failures until they attempted 7'2". Third, an inch behind Brown and Caruthers, was home town favorite Ed Hanks of BYU, a 5'9" shorty who was the happiest kid of the meet when he made 7'0".

Jim Helton of Utah State dominated the long jump until Gary Ard of Kansas took his last jump. Helton, second last year but little heard of between NCAAs, led the trials with 25'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and had all his leaps over 24-feet as most jumpers were well short of their best. Ard caught the big one on his final effort, soaring 25'9", and while Helton guttily responded with his best, 25'2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", it wasn't enough.

Javelin throwers had trouble with a wet runup in the non-counting qualifying round and some of them did much better in the finals, held two days later. Delmon McNabb, short and stocky and from Louisiana State, took over on the second round with a heave of 257'2" and was never challenged. He improved to 263'5" on his final toss and had another of 247'2", good enough to beat the 246'0" second place throw of Oregon's Bill Heikkila. Phil Lowry of Oregon State was the only other over 240-feet, hitting 243'1" for third as generous officials failed to call a single throw foul for landing flat.

Another of many favorites to win was Bob Narcessian of Rhode Island. With four throws over 190-feet he fought off Tom Fraus of Cornell (194'1") and Jim Kavanagh of Boston College (192'2") to win with 197'0". The others were far back.

The 880 was loaded with talent in depth, as seems usual in NCAAs these years. Qualifying runs were slower than usual, mostly because of slow first quarters, but the big guns were on the line in the final. Wade Bell of Oregon, the co-favorite with Dennis Carr of Southern Cal and Larry Kelly of Tennessee, has a patented backstretch move and he and teammate Jere VanDyk used it once again. Kelly, Ricardo Urbina of Georgetown, and Dave Patrick of Villanova streamed behind in pursuit but Carr seemed out of it as he struggled in next to last place with 180 yards to go. But Dennis, to whom the unexpected is usual, suddenly woke up. Charging wildly around the outside and down the homestretch, he caught them all but Bell and it seemed as if he would have won had he stayed in position. Bell's 1:47.6 was a soundly earned win over Carr (1:47.9), Kelly (1:48.1), Urbina (1:48.5), and Patrick (1:48.8). Buck grabbed the sixth in 1:48.9 as injured Pete Farrell ran 1:49.0 and VanDyk ran out of gas to check-in eighth in 1:49.2.

The steeplechase had its best ever field, headed by Bob Richards, the defending champ from BYU, Chris McCubbins of Oklahoma State, Conrad Nightingale of Kansas State, Bob Williams of Oregon, Web Loudat of New Mexico and Bob Price of California. Richards, who failed to qualify in the mile the previous night, inexplicably went out at a 2:13 suicidal pace as all except Price lagged in the rear of the pack. Richards had a 25 or 30 yard lead at one time but it caught up with him and the pack closed in, snapping at his heels. Just as McCubbins and gang were about to go by the faltering Richards the latter hit a hurdle and fell. But he was doomed anyway. McCubbins, full of run, began to pull away from friend Nightingale and widened the gap as they neared the end. His 8:51.4 was a good altitude mark, far ahead of the stadium record of 9:27.4, and well ahead of Nightingale's 9:00.0. Loudat came on to catch third ahead of Williams as Price, who also went out too fast, paid the price and finished fifth.

Unlike most of the other events, the intermediates produced two notable casualties in the heats. Tony Pickett of Houston came up lane while Dave Adkins, Alabama's 50.5 hurdler, slowed at the tape and was nipped out of a qualifying spot. Meanwhile, Bob Steele, the defender from Michigan State, and Jon Reimer of Iowa, who had beaten Steele all year, took over the favorite's role. Fastest time of the season belonged to USC's Geoff Vanderstock but he had been very ill from a penicillin reaction on Tuesday and coach Vern Wolfe figured Geoff would be lucky to reach the finals. Vanderstock figured he had nothing to lose and forged the early pace with Andy Bell of American. But Steele came on strongly in the drive to win in 50.2. After twice reversing their decision, officials finally awarded second to Bell and third to Vanderstock, 50.6 to 50.7, as was shown by the phototimer. Reimer dropped to sixth, while Roger Johnson of UCLA, second last year, was well back in seven.

Where phototimer photos were available, non-winning times were adjusted, using the hand-timed winning marks in accordance with the approved IAAF conversion factor. In cases where times differ, the adjusted mark is listed first, with the hand-timed mark in parentheses.

## Gaines 9.3, Proctor 26'5 3-4" With Wind

Sacramento, Calif., June 17--The wind blew away Bill Gaines and Jerry Proctor's record efforts, and one of hurdler Bill Tipton's. But Tipton and two other preps came up with national high school records at the Golden West Invitational. Tipton, of Central in Pontiac, Mich., sped the curved 180 low hurdles in 18.3; the 330 intermediates mark went to Joe Kurzrok of Mt. Vernon, N. Y. (37.3), and Karl Salb of Crossett, Ark., wiped out the oldest prep record when he muscled the shot 69'6".

Gaines, the only junior in the meet for senior stars, again raced a 9.3 100 to tie his national record. But an 8.9 mph breeze nullified it for record purposes. Officials let Gaines compete since he'll be too old for high school competition in New Jersey next year. Proctor put together an impressive wind-aided long jump series. He sailed 26'5 $\frac{3}{4}$ " (with an 11.3 mph wind) on his best attempt, and two others measured 26'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

Tipton swept over the 120 highs in 13.4, which would have topped the national record by a tenth had he not been helped by a 7.9 mph wind. The breeze quieted to 3.7 as he clipped three-tenths from the low hurdle mark. The ex-record holder, Wayne Collett, matched his old standard of 18.6.

## Stiles' Favorite Coliseum Race

What was the most exciting footrace ever held in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum? Was it the 1966 classic duel between Peter Snell and Jim Grelle? Was it Eddie Tolan vs. Ralph Metcalfe in the Olympic Games 100-meters in 1932, the Babe Didrikson-Evelyn Hall in the women's hurdles in that same Olympiad? What about the half-mile race run here last summer between Charlette Cooke of Los Angeles and Judy Pollock of Australia? That was the most dramatic and sensational race I've seen in the Coliseum since 1932. I have to go back to the 5000-meters of the tenth Olympiad for the most dramatic, roaring, man vs. man duel of them all.

That was the famous contest between Lauri Lehtinen, the Finn and an odds-on favorite, and Ralph Hill of Oregon. All anybody knew about Ralph Hill was that he had once run a mile in 4:12. It was agreed that Hill didn't belong on the same track with Lehtinen. Before the race was over, it appeared that Lauri thought so, too, for he tried his best to run Ralph right off the track into the infield.

It was a bitterly contested race in which Hill shook off the tiring number two Finn, Lauri Virtanen, and stayed right in the footsteps of Lehtinen. The last few laps it was a two-man race, all others having been outdistanced by nearly half a lap. Lehtinen had shortly before this race taken a big hunk off Paavo Nurmi's record for 5000-meters. Everyone was astonished to see Hill will with him, a stride behind, as they came off the final turn into the straight to make their drive for the tape.

American hearts beat fast and faster and Americans cheered loud and louder as they saw the amazing Oregon boy come into the final 100-meters with a fighting chance to win the gold medal. Lauri hugged the rail close with the tape less than 80-meters away. Lehtinen could see the shadow of Hill creeping up on his on his right. Lehtinen moved over into the second lane. Foul number one.

Hill sidled over, too, coming almost abreast--not quite. Before Hill could draw even, Lehtinen moved out to the third lane. Foul number two. Hill dropped back and tried to pass on the inside. Looking over his shoulder, Lehtinen saw what Hill was trying to do. So the Finn moved back into the second lane. Foul number three.

Now Hill again turned to the outside, to go around the right of Lehtinen. Lauri, looking back and keeping an eye on Hill, again ran out into the third lane. Foul number four. By now the Coliseum was in an uproar. The crowd was yelling for Hill to come, for Lehtinen to be a sport and give the American a chance to pass on one side or the other. Again Lehtinen moved over toward the pole as he saw Hill again try to come up inside him, to his left. Foul number five.

But Hill was a little too quick for him this time. Before Laur could quite close the gap, Hill was there with what one might figuratively call a foot in the door. Only it was not merely a foot. It was a torso. Lehtinen could not quite gain lane one again without forcing Hill clear off the track. At this precise moment, the tape loomed up. Both men lunged for it. The Finn managed to stumble over the line first, winner by less than a foot.

You've never heard such a Bronx cheer in your life as that boo boo the crowd gave Lauri Lehtinen. At this moment announcer Bill Henry, who was technical advisor to the Games, admonished the crowd, "Ladies and gentlemen, please remember that these people are our guests." The boos stopped. There was a smattering of applause, all of it, I think, for the man who deserved it: Bill Henry.

Charges of unsportsmanlike conduct were lodged against Lehtinen, but after more than an hour of deliberation, the gutless judge announced that in their opinion the Finn had not wilfully interfered with the American. Wilfully or not, there were five separate acts of interference. Had this happened in a horse race, the jockey probably would have been suspended for life.

Lehtinen was officially censured in effect by a statement issued by J. S. Edstrom of Sweden, president of the IAAF, who said, "Although the authorities of the Amateur Athletic Union (of the United States) consider the race not fairly run, there will be no official protest from either Mr. Hill or the United States."

Hill harbored no hard feelings. He said he felt it was not deliberate, that Lehtinen, weary, was merely steering a blind course. Blind course, my eye. But maybe Hill really won more than he lost that day in 1932. Today many people remember the name of Ralph Hill, of Oregon and the San Francisco Olympic Club. Those that do will ask, "What was the name of that guy from Finland who beat him out?"
