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## US Runners Dominate Pan Am Games

Winnipeg, Canada, July 29-Aug. 5--Led by double gold medal winners Van Nelson, Lee Evans and Earl McCullough, the United States track and field team overpowered the opposition in the fifth Pan-American Games.

Despite the absence of Charlie Greene, Jim Hines, Tommie Smith, Jim Ryun, Gerry Lindgren, Art Walker and Ed Burke, US athletes swept the 200, 400, 1500, 5000, steeplechase, high hurdles, intermediate hurdles, high jump, long jump, shot put, discus, javelin and won both relays. In addition they won the 800, 10,000, pole vault, triple jump, hammer throw and both walks. However, the Americans faced good competition in most events, although it was frequently provided by Canadians, many of whom had competed for colleges in the US. Only the high hurdles, high jump, long jump and shot put were dominated by the US's two entries, although the story probably would have been repeated in the pole vault. However, Paul Wilson injured himself before arriving here, leaving Bob Seagren as the sole American vaulter. He won at 16'1", a mark he has bettered in 33 meets (19 outdoors and 14 indoors) this year. The US was refused when it attempted to substitute Dick Railsback for Wilson, but Railsback will replace Wilson in the European meets.

Seventeen of the 24 meet records were broken and Seagren equalled the pole vault standard. Bill Toomey's 8044 points in the decathlon smashed the meet record of 7335 points but a wind-aided high hurdles nullified the mark. However, he became the first man to better 8000 points three times. C.K. Yang, Russ Hodge and Kurt Bendlin are history's only other 8000-point men. Runners smashed 10 of 12 meet records on the track, the marathon and walk records all fell, but only four of eight field event standards were bettered.

Twenty-one year old Van Nelson, who attends college in the state of Minnesota which borders this Canadian province of Manitoba, was the only athlete to win two individual gold medals in track and field competition. In the 10,000-meters, held in bright sunshine and 79° temperature on the opening day, he was forced to set the pace for most of the distance. Canadian Dave Ellis, American Tom Laris and Mexican Juan Martinez followed him and eventually finished in that order. As the runners reached the backstretch on the penultimate lap, Ellis suddenly darted into the lead, causing the pack to string out. The short Canadian running with a choppy stride increased his lead to 10 yards on the final backstretch. Nelson, at this point, claimed he had conceded the race to Ellis, but when he saw that Laris was only a few steps behind him, he decided to sprint to save second place. He closed on Ellis around the turn and then, with a kick that looked like Billy Mill's finish in the 1964 Olympic 10,000, sprinted past him 40 yards from the tape. The winner said, "I never thought I could catch Ellis. I guess I went into a super-high, I'm not a real strong finisher." His last lap was under 60 seconds.

In the 5000-meters run on a rainy evening four days later, Nelson won in 13:47.4 as the battle this time was for second place. American Lou Scott outleaned Martinez after the two had changed positions at least six times on the last lap. Scott claimed that he was lucky even to finish. He was at his home in Detroit when the riots broke out and was not permitted by the National Guard to work out. He only arrived here four days before his race.

Lee Evans also collected two gold medals but one of his was on a relay. In the 400-meters he was opposed by teammate Vince Matthews who had run 45.3 in a semi-final race and Canadian Don Domansky who had run 44.6 on a relay three weeks earlier. Domansky was in lane six, Matthews in lane seven and Evans was on the outside. Unlike previous races where he started slowly then won with his kick, Evans stayed even with the quick-starting Matthews for the entire lap. His strong finish nipped Matthews 44.9 to 45.1 as Domansky equalled his best of 45.8. After the race, Evans called the Tartan track "the best I've ever run on", and revealed that he plans to continue to go out fast in his races. Although his time is .1 second better than the 45.3 for 440 yards which he had run twice, he expects to run much faster soon. He said, "I can get down to 43

seconds in a few years. Tommie Smith is 23, I've just turned 20, and all quarter milers are best when they are over 25."

Evans had little competition in the 1600-meter relay as he and Matthews each ran 44.9 legs after opening efforts of 46.5 by Elbert Stinson and 45.7 by Emmett Taylor. Their winning time of 3:02.0 has been bettered only six times. Canada, with runners from Southern Illinois, North Dakota State and Oregon State, and anchored by Bill Crothers ran a good 3:04.8. They were hampered by the loss of Domansky who was injured in the 200-meters.

The short relay was even faster. The US team that ran 39.0 against the Commonwealth was intact except for Willie Turner replacing Jim Hines on the anchor position. After a 39.1 heat, they took the final in 39.0 but were disappointed. "We were shooting for 38.0", said Jerry Bright. Only Southern California and a French National team have run faster. A surprising Cuban team, minus Enrique Figueroa who was injured in his 100-meter heat, placed second in 39.2 as the first six teams all ran fast times.

Earl McCullough, who led off the 400-meter relay team, registered his second consecutive victory over Willie Davenport while winning his second gold medal in the high hurdles. As in the American trials, they occupied the inside and outside lanes, and McCullough had one false start charged to him. This time, however, the finish was much closer. Davenport caught McCullough at the eighth hurdle and the two ran together until the tape. The phototimer was needed to determine the winner but hand-timing gave McCullough 13.4 and Davenport 13.5.

Both sprints were won in swift times with good non-winning performances. After Figueroa was injured, the 100 battle seemed to be among Americans Willie Turner and Jerry Bright, Canadian veteran Harry Jerome, and Cuban Hermes Ramirez-Cajigal, a 10.2 man. After a 10.2 semi victory, Jerome got off to a good start in the final and held off the closing rush of Turner as both clocked a wind-aided 10.2. Ramirez-Cajigal held off Bright for the bronze medal, 10.3 to 10.4. In the 200, Bright and Jerome faced American John Carlos. Carlos had run a 20.3 for 220-yards plus 20.4 for 200-meters twice in major meets this year, yet he had been overlooked in the crop of great sprinters. After a 20.8 heat and a 20.5 semi, both wind-aided, he ran his usual strong race, pulling away from Bright in the stretch to win 20.5 to 20.9. This time Carlos was credited with a meet record, as the wind stayed below 4.473mph. Jerome injured himself during the race and jogged in last with a 31.1. Jamaican Lennox Miller and Trinidadian Ed Roberts were attending summer school at American Universities and were unable to compete.

The 800 and 1500-meters were both tactical races. In the shorter event American Wade Bell abandoned his tactic of a backstretch burst. He followed the slow pace for 600-meters, but when Canadian Brian MacLaren of North Dakota State spurted, he reacted and shot into the lead. Bill Crothers started his kick too late and could only run 1:49.9 to Bell's 1:49.2. However, he was suffering from an upset stomach. Canadian Dave Bailey led for most of the 1500 final but American Tom Von Ruden moved into the lead on the final turn and teammate Sam Bair passed Bailey in the last 50 yards. Von Ruden's 3:43.4 shaved .1 second from Jim Grelle's meet record and Bair's 3:44.1 was a personal best.

Another personal record was set by Chris McCubbins who improved his best for the third time this year. His 8:38.2 easily defeated teammate Conrad Nightingale who could only run 8:51.2.

Ralph Boston turned in the outstanding performance on the field. His winning jump of 27'2½" was his best of the year and marked the 11th meet in which he has jumped 27-feet or better. The winning effort came on his first attempt. He said, "I'm not in the best of shape so I wanted to get a good one early. This is not the year to be in your best condition. I'm saving it for next year."

American Ed Caruthers, whose only losses in 22 outdoor meets this year were second places in the NCAA and AAU meets, increased his chances of being ranked number one in the world in the high jump this year, as he defeated teammate Otis Burrell for the seventh time this year against one defeat. His winning height of 7'2¼" was his sixth clearance of 7'2" or better this season.

*Aug 4-13. 1967*

One of the few American victories that came as a surprise was in the hammer throw. Cuban Enrique Samuells was ranked seventh in the world last year when he threw 223'5" but American Tom Gage, who had placed only fourth in the AAU, won with a throw of 214'3 1/2" as Samuells' best effort was 212'1 1/2". It was a seasonal best for Gage, who had also produced his best mark of 1966 (219'2" at the Los Angeles Times International Games) in an important victory in a mid-summer meet.

American Gary Carlsen continued to keep the discus situation in such a turmoil that it is almost impossible to rank the top throwers. He had lost two consecutive meets to teammate Rink Babka who was beginning to look like the best competitor around. In fact, Carlsen had won only three of the 13 meets where he faced one or more of the top 10 Americans. However, despite a wind from the rear of the sector that bothered the throwers, Carlsen won in 188'7 1/2" as Babka had to come from behind to edge Canadian George Puce 186'7 1/2" to 184'4 1/2". Babka, who wanted to miss a minimum number of working days, arrived here late the night before the discus final. He thought that the late arrival hindered his performance.

Americans Randy Matson and Neal Steinhauer swept the shot put to the surprise of no one. Their best marks of 65'3 3/4" and 63'9 3/4" were a bit below par for them. Matson said he was "disgusted with my performance today. I guess I've been working so hard all year I'm slacking off."

## Europeans Upset Americans 108-101

Montreal, Canada, Aug. 9-10--Upsets highlighted the first-ever meeting between teams representing Europe and the Americas as the European men won 108 to 101. The Americans led in the track events 65 to 57, but European strength in the field events gave them a 51 to 36 advantage that resulted in an overall seven-point margin of victory.

Several stars were missing on each team. The Russians stayed away but their triple jump, hammer and javelin specialists weren't needed as the Europeans swept these events, along with the 800-meters, 5000-meters and discus. Viktor Kudinskiy, Valeriy Skvortsov and Igor Ter-Ovanesyan could have helped the Europeans, along with Italy's Roberto Frinoli. West Germany's Harald Norpeth would have been useful in only the 1500-meters, as the Europeans swept the 5000-meters. The Americans were missing Charlie Greene, Jim Hines, Tommie Smith, Wade Bell, Jim Ryun, Van Nelson, Ed Caruthers, Paul Wilson, Art Walker and Ed Durke, all from the US. Gerry Lindgren was scheduled to run the 5000-meters, but a mix-up in his transportation kept him from getting here.

The Americans swept only three events, the 400-meters, shot put and high hurdles. Vince Matthews upset Lee Evans in the 400, 45.0 to 45.1 after losing four races to him this year by margins of .3 second or less. The Europeans were far back in the first two events, but Italy's Eddy Ottoz pushed Americans Willie Davenport and Earl McCullough as .1 second separated each of the first three finishers. McCullough disliked the rubberized asphalt track but it was needed the first night when it rained.

Several other upsets occurred. The US's Chris McCubbins won the steeplechase in 8:44.2, beating Hungary's Istvan Joni and Great Britain's Maurice Herriott who ran 8:32.6 and 8:33.0 three weeks ago. Bob Seagren failed to clear his first height in the pole vault, as France's Herve D'Encausse cleared 17'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ " to defeat the US's Dick Railsback and Greece's Christos Papanicolaou, both 16'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". But the biggest upset occurred in the long jump. The US's Ralph Boston could only jump 26'0" so he was shunted to third behind teammate Bob Beamon (26'4 $\frac{1}{2}$ "") and Great Britain's Lynn Davies (26'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ""). With the exception of one meet where he was injured, this was the first outdoor meet where Boston had placed worse than second since the 1960 AAU.

Lesser upsets came in the 1500-meters where the US's Tom Von Ruden nipped France's Jean Wadoux 3:41.5 to 3:42.3, and the discus where Gary Carlsen finished last at 192'8" behind a sweep by Czech Ludvik Danek (200'1") and Italy's Silvano Simeon (198'4").

## Ryun Sticks to Decision to Rest

"All we are asking is 48 hours of his life to run for his country," said Art Lentz. Strains of "Stars and Stripes Forever" waft through the background. And who is this unpatriotic clod who heed the call of his country, and Lentz, Olympic Committee executive director? Well, it was none other than Jim (Benedict) Ryun.

Jim, ungrateful cuss that he is, didn't run in the Pan American trials at Minneapolis. And he won't run the Pan Am Games in Winnipeg on Aug. 4. He has said he didn't want to run so often there calling him Calvin Coolidge.

The subject of Ryun's treasonous reluctance was kicked around the sports desk. We hummed a few bars of the Star Spangled Banner, waved some flags and decided if Bobby Kennedy could climb mountains for his country surely Jim Ryun could run for his country. This puts Ryun into the Cassius Clay category. Cassius won't take one step forward for his country. Ryun won't take 1500 steps for ward. Next thing you know, he'll be lying down in front of a troop train, or refusing to get a haircut, or transferring to Berkeley.

Sufficiently lathered up, the sports desk drafted a protest petition. It was signed by four guys, three of whom volunteered to run on a relay team which would transport said petition back to the darkroom. The anchor man delivered it, breathlessly. A fellow (not Ryun) stared at it through a bottle of hypo, shrugged a shrug said, "Check the facts," and went back to printing pictures of Ryun.

So, what are the facts? Fact number one is that Ryun said "no" as early as May 1. He and coach Bob Timmons looked over summer schedule, decided it was too crowded and elected to pass the Pan Am Games. This provided breathing room between a pair of proposed maximum efforts on the west coast in June and July, important meets in Europe starting Aug. 12.

Track has become so embroiled in politics lately that folks are beginning to think trackmen think like politicians. They interpret a simple "no" to mean, "I could be drafted." Moguls have been shadowing Ryun for two months trying to get him to change his mind. Ironic, isn't it, that a young man who can run away from the worst in a track meet can't run away from the men who promote the sport.

But what about patriotism? How could Ryun be so callous toward a country which offered him such opportunity? Wouldn't American prestige suffer if the US flops in the 1500-meters at Winnipeg, as a national disaster it would fall a bit short of Adam Cla Powell and the Bay of Pigs. But it isn't likely, anyway. There were four sub-four-minute milers competing for two spots at Minneapolis even without Ryun. The competition Tom Von Ruden and Sam Bailey will face from other hemisphere nations includes only one sub-five miler (Dave Bailey of Canada). US prestige is more in danger in sprints and hurdles. Yet there are no offers of chartered plane people like Tommie Smith, Charlie Greene and Richmond Flowers all noticeable absentees. If you want to indict athletes for unpatriotic acts, why not try for size the star cagers whose absence led US basketball ignominy?

The national emblem does sway in the background. Not the stars and stripes. The dollar sign. The Minneapolis meet was something of an afterthought. Personnel for the Pan Am Games normally is determined in the AAU meet. But the NCAA wanted some of the participants plucked from its own meet. The Minneapolis trials evolved as a compromise. But, alas, ticket sales were down in Minneapolis. Nothing lubricates turnstiles quite so much as a Jim Ryun. Amateur athletic officials are altruistic. They scowl at any hint of professionalism. They lift their ostrich-like heads from sand to frown at any athlete who accepts a portable typewriter in lieu of the traditional foot-racing prize, a wrist watch. But they hesitate not a whit when their own buck is at stake. They don't mind applying pressure, even to the extent of attempting to direct the nation's scorn on a 20-year-old young man who wants nothing but to be left alone for a couple of weeks.
