### Eugene – June 18-21, 24-27

It had almost become a tradition that Eugene would host the Trials, and this was the 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive time that the Oregon town became the core at the centre of US Track and Field. It was, however, different, with the Covid-19 pandemic setting the meeting back a full year, and crowd attendance limited to a small number because of this. Temperatures were record breaking, with the meeting rescheduled on the final day because of excessive heat.

The fastest before the trials were 2016 Olympians Bromell (9.77) and Marvin Bracy. Both were heat winners, with Bromell's 9.84w the fastest of the day, while Bryce Robinson found 10.13 [10.126/+1.9] not quick enough to make the semi-finals, and was unlucky to be edged out by veteran Mike Rodgers [10.125/+2.7]. Ronnie Baker ran the fastest legal time of the round – 9.88 – holding off Fred Kerley. The Texan had made the unusual step of moving from the 400m where he was the world's #2 in 2019, to the 100m, and was clearly the dark horse of the field. Bromell and Micah Williams were the best starters in semi-final 1, and Bromell got clear after 40m to win in 9.90, leaving Bednarek and super-vet Gatlin to battle out second place. Despite a positive wind reading, the second race was slower, with 3 qualifiers, headed up by Kerley's 9.92, edging the smooth looking Baker (9.94), and Noah Lyles (9.97). Bracy pulled up after 30m.

Bromell, unsurprisingly, was the fastest away in the final, but less expected was Kerley's good start and pick-up. By 60m Bromell had a clear but slim lead, with Baker and Williams perhaps a foot back, and Kerley 4<sup>th</sup> just ahead of Bednarek. Bromell smoothly drew clear to win by a half metre from Baker and Kerley, with Bednarek running a fine 9.89 in 4<sup>th</sup> just ahead of Oregon's Williams. Other than Bromell, all of the top 5 ran lifetime bests. Gatlin, in the hunt at 30m, was clearly injured by halfway. After being a surprise in Eugene, Kerley would go on to win silver in Tokyo with a PR 9.84

Bednarek, one of the pre-Trials favourites [with Noah Lyles], and with 3 sub-20 clockings under his belt, got another one in the semi-finals, but was trumped by Knighton, the remarkable 17 year old, who had run a World Youth record of 20.04 in his heat. This time he broke Usain Bolt's World Junior record, passing Noah Lyles after 150m, and easing across the line in 19.88, with Lyles (19.91) well clear of LSU's highly rated Terrance Laird (20.22). Josephus Lyles had the unfortunate distinction of being the only man to run under 20.30 at the Trials and not make the final. Bednarek was out quickest in the final, and led off the curve, with Young and Lyles within immediate striking distance, and Knighton and Laird occupying 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> places 2 yards back. Lyles surged into the lead after 130m, and held off Bednarek to win by half a metre, while Knighton closed fastest of all to beat out Kerley, with 2-3-4 all running lifetime bests. For Knighton it was his 3<sup>rd</sup> PR in 3 days, and a world junior and youth record.

Pre-meet favourites were Norman and Ross, who had won the NCAA a week earlier in a world leading 43.85. Trevor Stewart was fastest in the heats with 44.75, with Michael Cherry and Eliza Godwin also ducking under 45 seconds in winning their heats. Cherry was a dominant winner of the first semi with 44.50, the fastest of the day, while Norman took the

other race in 44.73, with Ross moving from 5<sup>th</sup> to 2<sup>nd</sup> in the last 50m. LaShawn Merritt, the most successful OT 400 runner ever – winner of the 3 previous Trials finals, reached the end of the road, placing 7<sup>th</sup> in 46.27.

Norman, went to the front immediately in the final, and led at halfway in 21.2, with Cherry and Godwin a metre back. Cherry caught Norman at 300m, with Godwin still a metre back, some 5 metres ahead of the rest, with only Norwood trailing, some 3 metres behind the field. Norman broke clear of Cherry with 50m remaining, and won by over 2 metres. Cherry ran a PR 44.35, as Ross's strength drew him clear of the rest another 3-4 metres behind.

Only 1 of the first 3 first round heats was run with any sense of urgency. Erik Sowinski determined that he would at worst be one of the fastest losers, and duly finished 4<sup>th</sup> in his heat with 1:45.47, the 4<sup>th</sup> quickest run of the day, in a race won by Brazier in a seasonal best of 1:45.00 ahead of Brannon Kidder's PR of 1:45.06. The next day saw tactical races, with Clayton Murphy outkicking Brazier 1:46.26 to 1:46.57 in the first semi, and Bryce Hoppel taking the second race in 1:46.00 from Harris [1:46.16], with Jewett and Voelz both making the final. Isaiah Jewett led at 200m in the final, maintaining that pace to the bell [50.60] where he led Brazier by 3m, with Hoppel and Harris next. There was no let up by Jewett in the next 200, and he reached 600m some 8m clear of Brazier, with Murphy and Hoppel less than a metre back. With 180m to go Murphy flowed by Brazier, who clearly tightened up, and caught Jewett with 40m to go. Murphy finished in 1:43.17, his 3<sup>rd</sup> best ever, and Jewett improved his PR from 1:44.68 to 1:43.85. Hoppel needed a seasonal best of 1:44.14 to keep clear of Harris's 1:44.58. A disconsolate Brazier jogged in last, and later noted to the press that he had been trying to deal with hamstring and other niggling injuries.

Centrowitz, the reigning Olympic champion, and new star Cole Hocker, who had celebrated his 20th birthday 5 days late by winning the NCAA with a final 800 in 1:48.85, were the pre-race favourites. Even more precocious Hobbs Kessler, 18, who had broken Jim Ryan's US junior record with 3:34.36, ran somewhat slower in taking the first heat in 3:45.63, while Hocker [3:39.72] and Sam Prakes [3:39.02] won the other first round races. Kessler was outgunned in a tactical semi-final which saw Centrowitz and Hocker clarify their ratings with easy but restrained qualifying, while Engels and NCAA runner-up Nuguse were the best in the first, faster semi-final. Avila led the final through 400 in 58.50, and the pace slowed to 1:59.13 with Colby Alexander at the front, but with no-one wanting to lead. Centrowitz, moved up on the outside into the lead at the bell [2:42.6], with Hocker 3 yards back boxed in on the inside. Centrowitz kept winding up the pace and led by 3 metres with 150 to go, at which point Hocker, in 6th, suddenly accelerated and was in 2nd within a dozen strides. The two battled down the straight with Hocker edging Centrowitz by half a metre, while Nuguse got clear of Engels in the last 50 metres for the final Olympic spot. The overall advance in world 1500m running was reflected by the fact that Hocker's winning PR of 3:35.28 ranked him =57 on the pre-Tokyo world list. Hocker then went on to improve his PR twice in Tokyo, placing 6th in the final with 3:31.40.

Isaac Updike won the first heat in what would turn out to be the fastest time of the Trials – 8:21.01, with Fitsum Seyoum (8:28.72) missing out from the final despite being faster than Keter, the winner of the other heat in 8:29.04. Rio Olympian Cabral set the pace in the final, but it was clear early on that this would be a tactical race. A succession of laps [of 396m] in the 67-68 range took Cabral through kilo splits of 2:51.44 and 5:42.92. Bor took the lead approaching the penultimate water-jump, but was headed at the bell by Updike, with Keter and Ferlic a couple of yards back. Bor and Keter swept into the lead with 250m remaining, and the win was determined by Bor's cleaner clearance at the final hurdle. Ferlic went past Updike just after the water-jump, and took the final Olympic spot by 4m from Michalski. For Bor it was a second Olympic berth, while for Keter, who had become a US citizen in 2019, and Ferlic, who had finished 5th in 2016, this was their initial Olympic selections.

This was a slow paced final, with 12 men in touch with a kilometre to go, followed by a 600m race building to an all-out sprint over the last lap. Paul Chelimo, silver medallist from Rio, held the inside line and led the bunched group with 3 laps to go. Connor Mantz was the first to up the pace with a 30.8 200m split to the 4200m mark, but Chelimo, and Fisher swept by with 500m remaining, and were joined by Teare as the bell sounded. Two metres covered these 3, plus Kincaid, with 200m remaining, and Chelimo – constantly checking where the opposition was – let loose in the finishing straight and won by 2m – possibly the clearest 2m win since Nurmi beat Ritola in the 1924 Olympic 5000 – with Fisher a metre clear of Kincaid. All 3 Americans would make the final in Tokyo with Chelimo winning his second Olympic medal – a bronze – with a seasonal best of 12:59.05

Connor Mantz pushed the pace early, passing 4 laps in 4:22.63 [27:20 pace], but recognising the heat [26C/79F], eased off. From 4000m to 9000m only 2 laps were quicker than 68 seconds, and with a kilometer to go the pace had dipped from 27:58 at halfway, to 28:12. Grant Fisher led at the bell after a 63 lap, but there were still a dozen possible qualifiers. Fisher still led with 200m remaining, with Kincaid and Klecker well in touch, 10m clear of Ben True and Biya Simbassa. Kincaid passed Fisher halfway through the final curve and won by a clear 5m after a last 200 of 25.51. Fisher, a club teammate of Kincaid was second, with Klecker well clear of True for third.

Early leaders on the 3-loop course were Luke Puskedra [3M – 14:36] and Brian Shrader with Dan Nestor. After 10 Miles [49:07] Nestor was dropped, and Shrader passed halfway in 64:53, and still led by 23 seconds at 15 Miles [1:14:24]. Rupp then produced an uphill 4:57 mile into the wind, gusting occasionally to 20 mph, and took the lead – Shrader retiring just after 16 Miles. Abdirahman, Leonard Korir, Augustus Maiyo and Matt McDonald went with Rupp. At 19.5 Miles Rupp accelerated and was half a minute clear by 22 miles. Jake Riley joined the chasing pack at the 24 mile point, and with Abdirahaman was able to hold off Korir's strong finish. For both Rupp and Abdirahaman it was a second Olympic Marathon selection, with Abdirahaman at 43 becoming the oldest runner ever to be selected for a US Olympic team.

Event favourite Holloway opened proceedings with an easy looking 13.11, winning by 4 metres. Roberts and Cunningham ran 13.22 and 13.23 in the next heat, and Devon Allen and Michael Dickson in heat 3 with 13.26 were the other runners under 13.30 in the first round. Holloway moved from good to awesome in the semi-finals, producing an almost immaculate run to clock 12.81, the second fastest time ever, and the first run in the USA under 12.90. The conditions were perfect, as evidenced by PRs for all of the top 5 finishers. Roberts led the second semi-final till hurdle 6, when Allen took over and won by 1 ½ metres from Roberts [13.25] in 13.10. Holloway was 1/2m up on the field by the first hurdle, and went on to win by 1.5 metres. Behind him Roberts was second until the last stride, when Allen edged him by 1/100th, having moved up from 4th behind Cunningham at the 7th barrier. The American trio repeated as the USA's representatives from the 2019 World Championships. One of the hottest favourites to win in Tokyo, Holloway had a rare off day in the final, taking the last 2 hurdles too high, and losing momentum to finish 2<sup>nd</sup> in 13.09, with Allen 4<sup>th</sup> in 13.14.

With a series of exceptional PRs [10.03, 19.99, 44.31], Rai Benjamin was clearly one of the most talented athletes to have focused on the 400h. Carrying a best of 46.98 from 2019 into the event, Benjamin held back through his first two races and was 1 of only 2 [Selmon with 48.61 was the other] to duck under 49 before the final. Benjamin and Rosser shared the lead until hurdle 6, at which point Benjamin attacked, and by the 8<sup>th</sup> he was 6m clear. Selmon was the nearest, and he finished in an excellent 48.08, more than 10m behind the flying Benjamin, whose 46.83 missed Kevin Young's 29 year old record by 0.05 seconds. 5 days later his great rival Karsten Warholm of Norway ran 46.70 to finally eclipse Young's record, setting up a fascinating duel in Tokyo for Olympic gold. In the battle for the USA team David Kendziera ran a PR 48.38 to beat Aldrich Bailey, who ran a PR 48.55 in his 8<sup>th</sup> competition in the event. All of the top 5 ran PRs. Benjamin would smash the WR in the most remarkable race of the Tokyo Games, running 46.17, but losing to Warholm's 45.94

Only 6 of the finalists were able to clear 7-3, and two of those missed at the next height. 3 of the remaining 4 jumpers had been ranked in the top-4 in Track and Field News's prescient preview in April, Sullivan being the exception. With 2.27 proving no problem for the quartet, with only McEwen requiring a second jump, the jumpers moved to 2.30, which was the team decider. Kynard, whose 2012 Olympic silver had been upgraded to Gold in the wake of Russian doping scandals in April 2021, just missed 2.30 on his second attempt, and when his opponents all cleared 2.30 first time, took his remaining jump at 2.33, without success. At this point Harrison, with a clean sheet, was leading McEwen [1 failure] and Sullivan [3]. Sullivan moved into the lead with a first time clearance at 2.33 without disturbing the bar, and Harrison was well clear with his first jump. None of the trio were successful with jumps ranging from 2.36 to 2.39, leaving Harrison as the winner. The LSU junior originally had about 1 hour between the ending of the High Jump, and commencement of the Long Jump final, but the excessive heat in Eugene that day meant that the horizontal jump was put off until 8.30 that evening.

After all jumpers except Miller [18-4 ½] cleared 18-6 ½ in the qualifying, the same 11 went 1 better in the final, all making 18-8 ¼, which ensured that this would be the best US Pole Vault ever in terms of depth. Four jumpers went clear at 18-10 ¼ first time, with Scott Houston going clear on his third jump. Previously this would have guaranteed an Olympic spot. Here it was only good enough for 7<sup>th</sup>. At 19-0 ¼ Nilsen, Ludwig and Lightfoot had first time clearances, while event favourite Kendricks passed to 19-2 ¼ after one miss. Irwin missed at 19-0 ¼, leaving him 6<sup>th</sup> with 18-10 ¼, while Wooten cleared 19-0 ¼ on his second jump, earning him 5<sup>th</sup>. Nilsen, Kendricks and Lightfoot all made 19-2 ¼ first time, leaving Ludwig, who had produced first time clearances at every height through 19-0 1/4, in 4<sup>th</sup>. The team was now decided, and only 1 more clearance was made – Nilsen at 19-4 ¼. Nilsen would go on to win Silver in Tokyo with Lightfoot =4<sup>th</sup>. Kendricks had the misfortune of testing positive for Covid in Tokyo, and had to be replaced by Ludwig.

Jarrion Lawson led the qualifiers with 26-7 ¾w, but damaged his right hamstring, and the 2016 Olympic 4<sup>th</sup> placer had to sit out the final. Harrison was the 4<sup>th</sup> to jump in the final, succeeding Simpson 26-1 [26-8 from take-off], Dendy 26-0 ¼ [26-6] and Crawford 25-11 [26-5], and the HJ winner immediately took the lead with 27'0 ½ [27-6]. Jeff Henderson followed with 26-6 ¼, barely touching the board on what would have been 27-1+. Marquis Dendy then boomed a 27-6 jump, his best for 3 years, after Damarcus Simpson had started round 2 with 26-10 ½. That round saw Steffin McCarter jump 26-6 ½ and Isaac Grimes reach 26'5 1/4. Harrison reacted with a winning PR of 27-9 ½, and McCarter closed the third round with 27'1 ¼, using the board to the max. The Texas senior had the best jump of round 4 [27'0 ½], while Dendy closed out the competition with jumps of 27-2 and 27-2 ½. The best jumps by Harrison and Dendy measured toe-to-heel 28-1 and 27-11 respectively. All the US jumpers would be below their best in Tokyo, with Harrison the only finalist with his 5<sup>th</sup> placed 26-9.

The competition was clearly hurt by Christian Taylor's achilles injury which prevented him from competing; a similar injury suffered by Will Claye in 2019 had ruled out any competition in 2020, and restricted him to one 2021 competition before the Trials. America's next best Omar Craddock was ruled out through suspension for missing drug tests in 2020. After leading the qualifying round with 55-3 ½, Claye produced the only 17 metre jump of the first half of the final in round three with 56-1 ¼. Claye improved in the next round to 56-2 ¾, but lost the lead to Donald Scott's 56-4 ½. In round 5 Chris Benard jumped 55-3 to overtake Chris Carter [54-10 ¼] for third. Both men improved in the last round, Carter to 55-2 ¼, and Benard with 55-9 ¾. Scott backed up his best jump with 56-1 ½, but was trumped by Claye's winning leap of 56-5 ¾. Scott repeated his 56-4 ½ in Tokyo, this time for 7<sup>th</sup>, while Claye had his season's best of 57-2 ½ for 4<sup>th</sup>, missing the bronze by 1 ½".

The Rio trio of Crouser, Kovacs and Hill were expected to repeat, with Hill being the thrower most liable to be upset by Payton Otterdahl. Crouser, who had averaged 73-11 in 8 competitions prior to the Trials was the overwhelming favourite, and he lived up to his billing with a Trials record 75'2 ½ in the qualifying round, more than a metre clear of Kovacs [71-6 ¾]. Crouser continued in the final, opening with 74-2 ¼, improving to 74-7 in round 3, before producing an effort of 76-8 ¼ [23.37], breaking the 31 year old WR of Randy Barnes by 10". Crouser yelled with delight seeing the shot land, which was echoed by the crowd's roar, and immediate congratulations of his fellow competitors even before the distance was announced. Crouser had one more fair throw - of 74-2 ½ and averaged 74-8 ½ for his 5 throws. Behind him Joe Kovacs had taken a hold on second place with his opening 70-8 ½ and he showed his competitive mettle by then improving 4 times during the competition, culminating with his 6<sup>th</sup> round 73- 3 ½. Payton Otterdahl won the 3-way competition for 3<sup>rd</sup>, moving past Darrell Hill 69-4 with 69-10 ¾ in round 2, withstanding efforts by Hill of 69-8 ¼ and 71-10, and a final round 71-8 by Josh Awotunde, with his 5<sup>th</sup> round throw of 71-11. The Rio medallists repeated in Tokyo, with Crouser throwing 76-5 ½ and averaging 75-0 ¼, and Kovacs reaching 74-3 ½ for Olympic silver.

The shock of the qualifying round came when Sean Donnelly, who had thrown 260-1 a month earlier, recorded 3 fouls. Winkler, the 2016 winner and favourite, led qualifiers with 259-7, with 11 throwers reaching 230'0 or better. Winkler had thrown over 267'0 twice earlier in the season, so it was no surprise to see him open with 264'11. He then improved his own PR in the next round with 271-4, which broke Lance Deal's 1996 US record of 270'9, and was immediately congratulated by Deal. Behind him Daniel Haugh opened with 250-9, and followed it with 251-4. Alex Young and Conor McCullough duelled for third, with Young holding the upper hand with 248-5 in round two as compared with McCullough's 240-3. McCullough improved in round 3 to 244-10, but Young reached 249-4 and then 256-11 in round 6. Up ahead Haugh improved to 259-1 in the penultimate round before finishing with 260-5, which meant that all of the top-3 produced lifetime bests in the Trials, Winkler had again gone beyond 82 metres in round 4, with 82.10 – 269-4. Winkler finished with a 6 throw series that averaged 81.07/265-11. The Tokyo circle was less to the liking of the USA throwers, with Winkler finishing 7<sup>th</sup> [252-11] and Haugh 11<sup>th</sup> [250-1], which was nevertheless the first time the US had 2 OG finalists since 1964.

Curtis Thompson was always in command of the event, and had 4 valid throws exceeding the best of runner-up Michael Shuey, who reached 260-0. And averaged 260-3 with his 6 throws. After leading with his opening 263'7, he closed out the event with his best of 271-7. The battle for third was won by Riley Dolezal with 252-10, ahead of Marc Minichello 251-9 and Denham Patricelli 251-5. The Olympic qualifying standard was 85.00/278'10, which Shuey reached with 281-1 two weeks before the Games. By then he and Thompson had been approved to compete for a global ranking of 27 and 32nd respectively, according to World Athletics. Dolezal, ranked 33rd, just missed the cut.

The form chart had Scantling and Ziemek most likely to make the team. Scantling began with 2 PRs – 10.53 and 7.61w, scoring 1930, just 6 points ahead of Ziemek who had long jumped 25'4 ¾w. Scantling won the Shot with 52-2 ½ ahead of big [6-5/190] Kyle Garland's 51-9 ½. Garland, a junior at Georgia then went into the lead with a 7-1 ½ HJ to give him 3681 ahead of Ziemek 3635 off a 7-0 ¼ HJ, with Scantling on 3626. Scantling was the only one of these 3 to run quicker than 50.89 in the 400, with 48.86, giving him a lead of 70 points over Garland, with Ziemek a further 15 points back with his cumulative 4494. After 2 more events, where Scantling scored well with 13.88 and a Discus of 158-0, his score amounted to 6316, giving him a lead of 240 over Garland, with Ziemek 38 pts further behind, just 1 ahead of Bastien. The best of the contenders in the PV were Ziemek – a superb 18-2 ½, Harrison Williams 17-2 ¾, and Scantling 16-10 ¾. Seven of the 15 competitors had PRs in the javelin, but only 1 of the contenders, Bastien, whose 200-9 moved him into 3<sup>rd</sup> with 7688, with Scantling 8074 and Ziemek 7795, ahead, and Williams 7578 and Garland 7561, behind. Bastien was the best of the top echelon in the 1500, and his 4:22.21 overtook Ziemek [4:40.69] for second, well behind Scantling, whose 4:57.75 [more than 20 seconds slower than he would run in Tokyo] gave him 8647. Bastien followed with 8485 and Ziemek was third with 8471, PRs for all three. Of the 15 finishers, 6 had PRs, and 5 achieved seasonal bests, with 9 scoring more than 8000.

The heats were won by Gabby Thomas with a PR 11.00, Cambrea Sturgis, the NCAA winner, with 11.15 into a headwind, Javianne Oliver with a PR 10.96 ahead of Kayla White 10.99 and Teahna Daniels 11.02, seasonal bests for both, and most impressive of all – Sha'Carri Richardson with 10.84.

The following today wind conditions were a little too favourable as Richardson won the first heat after taking more than 50 metres to catch Daniels. She flew clear of the field and had time to point at the clock just past the finish when she reached the 90 metre point. Her time of 10.64 was impressive even with the wind at +2.6. Aleia Hobbs inadvertently twitched in the set position in semi-final 2, setting Thomas off to a false start. Hobbs was disqualified, but not Thomas. On appeal Hobbs was advanced to the final. Oliver was out quickest at the second start, and broke free of the field after 40m and with the wind at +2.5 clocked 10.83 ahead of Thomas (10.95).

Oliver was out fastest in the final, with Richardson again coming into her own in the second half, catching Oliver at 60m, and going away to win by 1 ½ metres. Daniels was third for the last 80m, and was nearly a metre clear of fast finishing Jenna Prandini, who edged Thomas and English Gardner for 4<sup>th</sup>.

The enervated Richardson afterwards enthused about making the Olympic team, how crazy the season had been [3 sub 10.80 marks as part of that] and how the death of her birth mother had affected her in the week leading up to the Trials. This was again mentioned 5 days later when she was banned for using marijuana, a drug not noted for making people faster. She was suspended for a month to 28 July, but USATF decided to leave her off the squad for Tokyo.

Tamara Clark ran an excellent 22.44 in heat 5 of the first round, the slowest winning time of that round. Gabby Thomas was the fastest with a PR 21.98, while Oregon graduate Jenna Prandini ran 22.14, a PB for her. NCAA winner Cambrea Sturgis and Anavia Battle won the other two heats in 22.37. A grand total of 27 athletes faced the starter, and 4 races could have been run without using the two inside lanes, giving a more competitive feel to the heats. Both Prandini (21.99) and Thomas (21.94) again ran PRs in the semi-finals, with Prandini leading by 2 metres at halfway [11.1] from Bryant, Irby and Felix. Felix's 400m strength told and she finished second in 22.20 in the outside lane, as 5 qualified from this race. Thomas was a meter clear of the field, with 100m splits of 11.2/10.7 to beat Battle and Clark by 4 metres.

Thomas and Bryant were away fastest in the final, and Prandini ran the second half of the curve well to be less than a metre behind Thomas at halfway. Battle, Clark and Bryant were level, fractionally ahead of Felix a metre back. Thomas powered down the stretch steadily drawing away to win by nearly 3 metres in 21.61 to put herself #2 on the world all-time list. Prandini won the battle for second, holding off Battle and Clark, as all of the top-4 ran lifetime bests, with Battle and Clark running best ever times for placings. Felix ran a seasonal best for the third time out of five Olympic Trials finals, her best time since 2016, and Bryant missed her 2015 PR by 0.06

The art of running just fast enough to qualify meant that only 4 athletes – Felix, Jonathas, Irby and Whitney – broke 51 seconds, with the curious quirk that the last 3 would run against each other in both preliminary rounds, all qualifying each time. Fastest non qualifier was 2016 Olympian Courtney Okolo on 52.37, though the seeding meant that Brittany Aveni was able to make the semis with 52.54.

Ellis led the first semi-final early on, won by 1 ½ metres from Felix. Hayes and Irby battled for the lead for the first 300m in the second semi-final, before Hayes pulled away, with Irby being overtaken by Jonathas and Whitney in the last 15m. The first 4 were faster than Ellis's 50.83, and 5 in all made the final from this semi, leaving Jessica Beard a non-qualifier with 51.49.

Most of the speculation before the final centred on whether America's most medal winning athlete, Felix, might again make a US Olympic team. Ellis, one lane inside Felix, was the fastest to 200m [23.4] just ahead of Hayes. Fastest in the third 100 was Jonathas, who moved past Ellis into second, just behind Hayes, with all but Anderson in touch. Quickest over the last 100 was Felix, who moved from 5<sup>th</sup> to 2<sup>nd</sup>, only passing Ellis with 20m to go, as Hayes held form to win in 49.78 from Felix, who caught Jonathas on the line. A loss of form in the Tokyo final would mean that Hayes would miss out on the Olympic 4x400, an event which saw the other 5 of the top-6 in the trials win Olympic gold medals, with Felix preceding this with a 400m bronze. The awards won by Felix almost reads like a litany, with 7 Olympic Golds, including 4 consecutive 4x400 titles, and 11 medals in all, the most by any track athlete.

As a 17year old High Schooler in 2019 Mu [pronounced Mo] was little known and finished her season with bests of 51.98/2:01.17. Indoor marks in 2021 of 50.52/1:58.40 got her noticed. By the time of the trials Mu had set a US junior records of 1:57.73, and 49.57 when winning the NCAA 400. Chanelle Price was the fastest heat winner with 1:59.86, as the other 4 heats were won with times ranging from 2:00.55 to 2:00.85.

Chanelle Price led the first semi-final through 400m in 58.96 from a closely bunched field, and kept the lead until Mu went past with 90m to go. At that moment Sage Hurta, in 5<sup>th</sup>, tripped and fell after coming into contact with Hanna Green's heel. Up ahead Mu finished in 1:59.31, just ahead of Kate Grace (1:59.43) with Price also under 2 minutes [1:59.90]. Green was disqualified but advanced on appeal. The second semi-final followed a similar pattern with 3 dipping under 2 minutes, led by Ajee Wilson, who had followed Allie Wilson through 400 [59.72] and then took the lead with 140m remaining to win in 1:59.49 from a fast closing Raevyn Rogers [1:59.66], with Allie Wilson 3<sup>rd</sup> in 1:59.94.

Price led through 200 in 27.32, with Nia Akins falling as the athletes converged after the lane break on the back straight. Price led at the bell [57.44], but Mu went ahead 30m later and passed 600m in 1:27.75, with Grace, Green and Ajee Wilson closed behind. Without apparent effort the tall and statuesque [1.78m/56kg] Mu began to flow away from the field, and had a margin of 12 meters by the finish, reached in 1:56.07. Behind her US junior record, Rogers [1:57.66] finished well, moving from 5<sup>th</sup> to second early in the finishing straight, while Ajee Wilson took third in 1:58.39, holding off the fast finishing Michaela Meyer [1:58.55].

Mu would go on to win 2 Gold medals in Tokyo – the 800 leading from gun to tape with a US record 1:55.21, featuring a negative split [57.82/57.39], followed by the fastest split of the 4x400 relay [48.32] when anchoring the winning US team.

The form chart for the 1500m produced in April by Track and Field News showed US record holder Shelby Houlihan as the favourite, but Houlihan was banned in June for a positive test for Nandrolone, leaving Elle Purrier as the one most likely to win. Purrier duly won both of her preliminary races, with 3 time Olympian Jenny Simpson following her home in the semi-finals. Heather MacLean was disqualified for colliding with an off balance Sinclair Johnson, but reinstated as both advanced to the final. The second semi-final was a quicker affair 4:05.87 vs 4:09.18, with Nikki Hiltz prevailing as 7 finished in 4:09.65 or better with all 7 making it to the final.

8 seconds into the final Purrier got shoved onto the infield, and this determined her tactics of going to the front and staying out of trouble. Purrier led a bunched field through 400m in 64.79, and stretched the field out with a slightly quicker second lap of 64.42. Cranking up the pace in the third lap got rid of everyone except Cory McGee, and Purrier reached the bell in 2:56.1, with McGee a tenth back, with Osika [2:56.9] and Dani Jones 2:57.0] well ahead of MacLean [2:58.0]. McGee stayed with Purrier until 150m remained, and then the diminutive Purrier eased away to win by almost 20 metres. A 3:58.36 in early May showed her class, and she eclipsed her PR with 3:58.03, which also broke Mary Slaney's 1988 meeting record of 3:58.92. MacLean caught Osika with 150m remaining and just held off Osika's charge at the end of the race. Neither Simpson nor Hiltz was a factor in the race. Purrier and McGee would go on to make the Tokyo final, with Purrier best placed - in 10<sup>th</sup> with 4:01.75.

Alex Wilson led the field through the first kilometre [3:09.9] in the final, with Frerichs at her shoulder, and the field bunched up. With 4 laps remaining Frerichs went to the front. At 2000m Frerichs [6:13.8] only had Emma Coburn and Leah Falland for company, with Marisa Howard leading Wayment and Murphy some 7-8 metres back. Falland fell with 2 laps to go, and would drift back to finish 9<sup>th</sup>. Coburn went to the front with 700m remaining, led by 5 metres at the bell, and won by 20 metres, her third consecutive Trials victory, with Frerichs more than 50 metres clear of Val Constien an isolated third. In Tokyo it was Frerichs who was the top American, with a much merited silver medal after breaking the race open in the second kilometre.

Abbey Cooper was fastest in the heats with 15:07.80, more than 15 seconds quicker than anyone else, and her best for 6 years. A temperature of 94o militated against a fast pace in the final. Taylor Werner was the initial reluctant leader with two laps of 75 and 79. The pace dawdled along at 15:50 pace until 3400m when Karissa Schweizer upped the pace from 75 to 71, reducing the pack from 15 to 7, and laps of 70 and 67 drew Schweizer, Cranny, Cooper and Schneider well clear. At the bell Cooper was struggling to stay with the other three, and would place 4<sup>th</sup>. Schweizer led most of the last lap, and was only overtaken on the inside by Cranny with 60m remaining. The margin of 0.30 was even less in Tokyo with Schweizer 0.18 seconds and 2 places ahead with 14:55.80 in 11th

The race was rescheduled to 10 am because of the hot weather, and the first 2 kilometres were run at 32 minutes pace. Sisson then took the lead, moving up from a 77 pace to 74.36. A series of 75 second laps reduced the pack from the initial total of 41 to 10 at halfway [15:49.18]. Sisson increased the pace to 74 second laps. At the 8 kilo mark only the 5000 team of Cranny, Schweizer and Schneider, plus Alicia Monson, were in touch, with Schneider beginning to fade. Sisson's pace was continually increasing with 72.58 – 72.48 – 71.47 and 71.25 leading to the bell with a margin of 10 seconds over Monson. Sisson's advantage at the finish was nearly 13 seconds over Schweizer, with Monson 90m clear of Cranny in 3<sup>rd</sup>. Sisson was again the best American in Tokyo with 31:09.58 in 10<sup>th</sup>.

Just after 20 miles Molly Seidel went to the front, and an uphill mile of 5:32 dropped Hall, Sisson and Molly Huddle. Seidel surged again after 22 miles, and only Tuliamuk went with her. The Kenyan born Tuliamuk went clear in the last mile and missed her PR by 33 seconds. Sally Kipyego, 2012 Olympic silver medalist for Kenya, took third. Seidel, whose

Olympic aim was ” to go in and for people to think, 'who the hell is this girl?'" did just that, winning a bronze medal, running 2:27:46 in humid conditions.

The strength of this event in the USA could be seen from the fact that 11 ran under 12.70 during the meet. Race favourite was Keni Harrison, and she duly was quickest in the first round, winning the first heat in 12.49. 2016 Olympic champion Brianna McNeal was next quickest with 12.50 in the final heat. McNeal was competing, although a ban had been levied on her for “tampering with the anti-doping process”, and a CAS appeal was underway at the time of the Trials. Not making out of the heats was 2008 Olympic champion Harper-Nelson, competing in her 5th Trials meeting.

Tonea Marshall, top of the US list with 12.44, started fast in semi-final 1 alongside Christina Clemons [formerly Manning] and the two duelled to the finish with Marshall winning by 0.01 in 12.50, with McNeal clear of Cunningham 12.56 to 12.61. Harrison also clocked 12.50, winning comfortably over NCAA champion Anna Cockrell.

Less than 2 hours later the final took place, with McNeal and Marshall out best, and Harrison 6th at the first hurdle. By the 5th hurdle, Harrison had moved to the front with McNeal, Marshall, Clemons and Cunningham vying for second. Marshall then began to lose ground, and Harrison was the clear winner, with McNeal fractionally ahead of Clemons and Cunningham. 12 days later the court of Arbitration upheld the suspension of McNeal [until 2025] and Cunningham made the team. Harrison went on to win a silver medal in Tokyo.

Muhammad and McLaughlin had produced one of the highlights of the 2019 season with Muhammad setting a WR of 52.16 in the World championships ahead of McLaughlin's 52.23, #2 of all-time. McLaughlin, with a sprint hurdles improvement to 12.65 and the world's fastest time – 52.83 – was the favourite leading into the Trials with Muhammad and Shamier Little [53.12] just behind. McLaughlin was fastest in both preliminary rounds with 54.07 and 53.03, while Little headed Muhammad 53.71 to 53.83 in the semi-finals. Nanya Hailey was the only other athlete under 55, with 54.24 behind McLaughlin.

The final was delayed until 9.20 pm because of the heat, which had dropped to 95o by race time. Muhammad started fastest and had a slight lead over McLaughlin and Little until the 8th hurdle, where Little lost her balance after touching down, and was eventually overtaken by NCAA winner Cockrell after the 9th hurdle. Up ahead McLaughlin passed Muhammad between the 9th and 10th hurdles, and went away to win by 4 meters with the first ever sub 52 run – 51.90, with Muhammad finishing in 52.42. Cockrell beat Little by a metre 53.70 to 53.85, and the team was set. In Tokyo, the duo outdid themselves with McLaughlin again gaining the upper hand, this time off the final hurdle as the two ran the jaw dropping times of 51.46 and 51.58.

In 2016 Cunningham and McPherson had jumped 1.97 and 1.93 behind Chaunte Lowe's 2.01. Cunningham had a clean sheet all the way through to her final height of 2.02. McPherson and Greene, who both cleared 1.93 were unselected as neither had the Olympic qualifying height of 1.96, while 4th placed Rachel McCoy, who had cleared 1.96 did make the team. A bizarre note was added when Ty Butts-Townsend, 14th in the OT qualifying and 8th at the 2019 Worlds, who had not gone higher than 1.87 in 2021, was deemed by World Athletics to have a World Ranking in 2021 good enough for Olympic selection. She placed 31st and last in the OG qualifying confirming a fault in the selection process. Cunningham repeated her 1.96 in Tokyo, tying for 6th.

The opening height in the final was 4.35m, and 10 of the 13 then made 4.50. At 4.60 Nageotte, LeLeux and Morris led, all with no failures, while Gruver, with a miss at 4.35 was 4th, ahead of Jenn Suhr, competing in her 5th Trials, who got over 4.60 second time. Only Nageotte, first time, and LeLeux on her final attempt made 4.70, meaning Morris was a second time Olympian, despite jumping below her usual level. Nageotte then made 4.80 first time to ensure the win, and then negotiated 4.95 at her second attempt to set a PR and the world's leading jump of 2021. Nageotte went on to win a nail biting Olympic pole vault with 4.90, but her teammates had less good fortune, with LeLeux no-heighting in the final, while Morris failed to qualify after injuring herself on a warm-up jump for the qualifying round.

There has never been a better athlete, in terms of peaking for the Trials, than Brittney Reese. In 3 previous appearances Reese had won the Trials Long Jump, and always with a seasonal best – 6.95 in 2008, 7.15 in 2012, and a lifetime best of 7.31 in 2016. Among team contenders, only Kendell Williams, focusing on the Heptathlon, was missing. After leading the qualifiers with 6.86, Reese opened up with 22-9 1/4w [6.94] in the final, good enough for third on the day, and was closely followed by Tara Davis, collegiate record holder, with 6.92. TJer Orji and Quanesha Burks were both on 6.68. There were no changes until round 3 when Tiffany Flynn moved into third with 6.75, followed by Malaina Payton's 6.69. Olympic champion Tianna Bartoletta jumped 6.54 which gained her only 10th place. While there were no 7m jumps in the first 3 rounds, the last 3 produced 5, with Davis getting within 10cm of her NCAA record with her 5th round 7.04 to ensure second place behind Reese, who produced effort of 7.11 and 7.13 in rounds 4 and 5. Burks settled any doubts for third place with her 22-10 [6.96] in the 5th round. Reese had again triumphed at the Trials...with a seasonal best. The 2012 Olympic champion announced her retirement later in the season, after winning silver in Tokyo.

This was thought to be a battle between Ealey, Ewen, Ramsey and Saunders. These 4 led the qualifying, headed by Saunders 19.16, with the only surprise being the failure of Felisha Johnson, 2016 Olympian, to make the final – recording 3 fouls.

Ramsey led at the end of round 1 with 19.45, just 5 cm short of her PR, and half a metre clear of Adelaide Aquilla. The Ohio State senior had become a contender after improving from 58-5 ½ in 2020 to 62-8 ¾ and NCAA indoor titles under the tutelage of Ashley Kovacs, Joe’s wife and coach. Ewen moved past Ealey [18.39] with 18.92 in the second round, but dropped to 4th when Raven Saunders boomed a PR 65-6 in round 3. Having a “day of days” Ramsey then reached 66-0 ¼ [20.12] in round 4. Things were less positive in Tokyo for Ramsey, as she fouled out in the Olympic final, though Saunders threw 19.79 to win silver.

If this was an event which followed form, distances achieved were as impressive as in the men's event. Price led the qualifiers with 252-11, ahead of Alyssa Wilson's PR 241-11, with 6 in total exceeding 70 metres. Price opened up with 255-4, and followed that with 257-7 [78.51] just 9cm short of her US record. Behind her, Andersen took control of runner-up spot with successive throws of 244-0 and 255-0 [77.72]. Gwen Berry took third place with her opening throw of 241-2 [73.50], but it was a close run thing, as Janee' Kassanavoid threw 241-0 [73.45] in round 2. The next round saw a new US record as Price moved to #2 all-time with 262-5, tantalisingly close to 80 metres with 79.98. Price didn't have to wait long, as she then reached 263-6 [80.31]. Winger [3 times] and Malone [2] both previous Olympians were expected to qualify again with Ince and Allgood-Whetstone their most likely rivals. Winger led the final with her 201-8, one of her 3 throws beyond 61 metres. Malone, the other 60m thrower on the day, reached 60.74 in round 2, before hitting a winning 208-4 [63.50] in round 5. The battle for third was won by Allgood-Whetstone with a PR of 193-4, ahead of Ince's 188-7. However, Ince won the war, as her seasonal best of 61.64 – and more importantly her World Athletics rating of 15th – ensured her Olympic selection. Malone was the only American to make the final, placing 10th with 59.82, though her qualifying mark of 63.07 would have placed 6th in the final.

The T&FN prognostication had the top-3 as Bougard-Williams-Kunz, and these were the 3 who qualified to Tokyo, though in reverse order. Kunz had 5 lifetime bests over the 2 days. All 3 candidates ran under 13.00 in the hurdles, which was won by Taliyah Brooks's 12.85. Bougard and Williams led the high jump with 1.87 and 1.84 respectively. Kunz won the shot with 15.73, more than 1 ½ metres ahead of the field, and a PR 23.71 took her to a PR first day score of 4042. Behind her were three over 3900 led by Brooks 3946, ahead of Williams 3924 and Bougard 3912. The Long Jump was held in the heat of the final day of the Trials, and while Brooks reached 6.36, she then collapsed and had to be taken to hospital. Williams won with 6.73w ahead of Kunz and Bougard's 6.50. All 3 produced PRs in the Javelin, led by Williams 47.41, ahead of Bougard 46.75 and Kunz 45.06. Ashtin Mahler, who would place 5th with 6273, won the JT with 5130, and the 800 was led by Michelle Atherley who ran a PR 2:08.86 to score 6352 in 4th. With 6 events completed Williams led Kunz by just 2 points with 5816, with Bougard in third [5716]. Bougard was the quickest of the three with 2:10.93 to score 6667, and Kunz overtook Williams with 2:15.24 to win with 6703 ahead of Williams 6683, after a 2:16.85. Williams, Kunz and Bougard would finish 5-6-9 in Tokyo.
