Matson Dazzles With 66'3-4", 186'11"

Corpus Christi, Texas, Mar. 27--Abilene Christian College and Randy Matson took honors in the third annual Corpus Christi Relays. Abilene Christian scored in every event except the pole vault to win from Rice 75-71, while Matson doubled again with 66'3/4" and 186'11".

Rice's NCAA high hurdles champ Bobby May won the highs in 13.9, the intermediates in 52.9, and ran the lead-off leg on a winning 41.1 sprint relay--all in meet record times.

The closest competition of the meet came in the expected mile relay duel among Rice, Baylor and Abilene Christian. Ted Nelson of Texas A & M started the race well with a sub 47.0 lead-off leg, but it quickly became a three-way race. Rice's Jim Ellington managed to stave off a closing rush by ACC's tall, high-striding anchorman, Lynn Saunders to win by a tenth, 3:10.5 to 3:10.6. Baylor was an easy third clocking 3:11.4. Only Southern has run a faster time than these three this year.

Saunders, whose anchor stint was 46.9, had earlier beaten Nelson in the open 440, 47.1 to 47.5.

Steinhoff Second Prep Over 16-Foot

Santa Barbara, Calif., Mar. 27--Bob Steinhoff of Warren high in Downey, Calif., cleared 16'1" in the 27th Easter Relays to defeat teammate Paul Wilson for the second time in 10 days.

Although hampered by a cold wind, Wilson didn't start vaulting until the bar was at 15'6" which he cleared on his first try. At 16'1" Wilson had trouble with his steps and didn't come close, once running through the pit. Steinhoff, however, went over on his first attempt, just brushing the bar. After the new 16-footer had walked out of the pit, the quivering bar fell off. Officials ruled that the vault was good though, and that the wind had blown the bar off. For the 16'1" effort, Steinhoff was voted unanimously as the Athlete of the Meet. He had also defeated Wilson at 15'0" on the misses rule in a dual meet at Bellflower just two days before Wilson's high school record breaking 16'6 3/4" vault on March 20.

Vaulters seemed to be the only athletes who could attain good performances en masse as three others cleared at least 15'6". Marc Savage, transfer student from Cal now at UCLA, won the university class vault at that height from Terry Cox of Oregon State. Bob Seagren of Mt SAC JC upped his day-old JC record of 15'5 1/4", set in a dual

meet with Citrus JC at Walnut, to 15'6 1/4".

Three UCLA frosh turned in outstanding performances for the cold weather and chewed-up track. Norm Jackson, 23-year-old former US Air Force sprint champion, ran a 9.5 century, Don Domansky ran a 46.6 mile relay anchor leg to bring the UCLA frosh home first in the university division with a 3:14.1, and George Husaruk ran a 9:05.8 two-mile for second place behind Oregon State's Tracy Smith, who ran 9:00.6.

An expected dual in the two-mile relay between UCLA and Oregon State failed to materialize when UCLA got off to an early lead and was never threatened. Morgan Groth ran a 1:50.5 anchor but could make up very little as Bob Day's 1:50.9 brought UCLA home in 7:30.4. Oregon State was second with 7:38.8.

John Rambo took the high jump from fellow Olympian Ed Caruthers (6'7 1/2" at 6'9 1/2").

US Thrashes Britain, 70-47

London, April 2-3--Olympic champions Billy Mills and Lynn Davies shared top honors as the United States trounced Britain, 70-47, in the first-ever indoor match between the countries, at Wembley Pool in London.

Mills, still weary after his runaway cross country victory in Italy the previous weekend, treated the disappointingly small crowd to a superb display of front running in the three-mile. Leading from gun to tape, he held off the game Englishman John Cooke to win by four yards in 13:36.8, fastest ever recorded on a European board track. Mills' mile splits were 4:28.8, 4:42.6 and 4:25.4. Cooke rewarded with a European record of 13:37.6. Former world mile record holder (3:57.2 in 1957), Derek Ibbotson--nearing his 33rd birthday--was third in 13:46.4 and Frank Pflaging, though last, ran a lifetime best of 13:49.0.

The long jump, featuring shock Olympic victor Lynn Davies and his predecessor Ralph Boston, fully lived up to its exciting promise. This was their fourth clash, and the 22-year-old Welshman evened the score at 2-2, Boston having beaten him in last summer's AAU and in a post-Olympic meet at Osaka. Davies, looking stronger than ever (he has spent most of the winter lifting heavy weights) and competing for the first time since he was downed by Igor Ter-Ovanesyan in Cuba last December, twice broke his national indoor mark of 25'6 1/2" with leaps of 25'9" and 25'9 1/4"--but it was a breathtakingly close duel for Boston finished just three-quarters of an inch behind. Davies jumped 25'3 3/4", 25'9", 25'5", 22'2", foul (of 25'4"), and 25'9 1/4". Boston's series was a foul (of 26'1"), 25'5 1/4", 22'1 1/2", 25'7", 25'8 1/4", and 25'8 1/2". For good measure, Charley Mays jumped 25'6 1/2" and 25'6 1/4" and always looked capable of surprising the other two. Three men within three inches--this was world class long jumping at its finest. Davies and Boston are scheduled to meet twice in July: at Los Angeles and Cardiff.

Britain won only two other events, the mile and--most unexpectedly--the high jump. John Whetton avenged an earlier defeat in Toronto by Jim Grelle (the only man to have beaten him in 20 indoor mile races) with a convincing victory in 4:08.5. He covered the final quarter in 55.5--a scorching pace on Wembley's tricky 145 yard track. Grelle, in fact, was shunted back to third, for in a somewhat violent tussle he was edged by Olympic fourth placer Alan Simpson in 4:09.7. Gordon Miller's win over Gene Johnson and Ralph Boston constituted

the first major British high jump success since Alan Paterson won the European title in 1950. Miller, in clearing 6'10" for the first time, set a national mark.

Mel Pender (60), Mike Larrabee (440), Ted Nelson (880), Ralph Boston (60 hurdles), Jeff Chase (pole vault), John McGrath (shot) and the medley relay team accounted for the other American wins.

The US girls won their first international match since 1958, the score being 38½-33½. Fifteen-year-old Marie Mulder, from California, received tumultuous applause for her runaway victory in the invitational 880. She was timed in 2:15.0, following a first 440 in 63.8, and looked like a world beater in the making.

Matson Just Misses Record With 67'9"

Austin, Tex., April 2-3—Sophomore giant Randy Matson, with feather-touch ease, pushed the shot to 67'9" here in the 38th annual Texas Relays Saturday afternoon, just an inch shy of the world mark held by Dallas Long. Matson, a double Texas Relays record smasher with a 188'8" discus toss, was voted the "outstanding performer" of the meet in the university division.

Although Matson's shot put effort monopolized the admiration of the 8000 fans, relay quartets sizzled to six records in the university and college divisions. Too, John Hartfield of Texas Southern established an overall meet record of 6'10½" in the high jump, Bobby May of Rice missed a record of 13.7 in the high hurdles because of a 6.5 mph aiding wind. (Including heats and finals, May ran in nine races in two days. He had windy hurdle heat times of 13.8 and 14.0, two mile-relay legs including a 46.9 in the final, two 440-yard relay, and two 880-yard relay legs.)

The shot put preliminaries were held Friday morning, and Matson broke Bill Nieder's university division meet record of 59'9" from 1956 with each put. He opened competition with a "poor" 60'5", and it was on the first effort of the finals Saturday afternoon that he reached 67'9". Matson's series was 60'5", 62'9", 65'9", 67'9", 64'9", 64'10¼". His average of 64'4¼" would have been fantastic had

he not slipped on the first effort. (Ed: Meet promoters claim Matson's mark will not count as a collegiate record because there was no steel ring. International rules demand such a ring for world records but the NCAA Rules book does not so indicate that there must be a steel ring for a collegiate record.)

His record 188'8" in the discus came in the preliminaries without the aid of a full windup. The ring was slick because of showers, and all of the throwers were ripping foul trouble.

Although Southern Illinois was hipped off an outstanding 3:19.4 record victory in the sprint medley, it was the one-mile relay events that produced the greatest mass competitive results.

In the university division preliminaries of the one mile relay, it took 3:12.5 to qualify for the eight-team finals. Baylor and Nebraska led into the finals with 3:10.4s, and Abilene Christian barely made the cut with a fourth place 3:11.3 in the fast heat. This was only an indicator of things to come.

Texas Southern's Tigers of the college division cracked Abilene Christian's overall Texas Relays record of 3:07.9 with a 3:07.8. Ray Saddler's lonesome run of 45.4 on the anchor fueled the TSU foursome to the record. He won by at least 30 yards. Texas Southern's splits were Jose Villalongo 48.1, Herb Stevens 47.6, James Hines 46.7, and Saddler 45.4.

Abilene Christian stormed back in the university finals a few minutes later to threaten a recapture of the mark. The ACC foursome fell short with a 3:08.5, but the competition was torrid with sixth place Drake clocking 3:11.8. Lap times for Abilene Christian were Gale Harrison 48.2, Doug Thompson 47.1, Riley Dunn 46.5, and Lynn Saunders 46.7. Rice finished second in the race with 3:09.0, followed by Southern Illinois 3:10.4, Baylor 3:10.6, Kansas State 3:10.9, and Drake.

Bill Cornell ran one leg for the Southern Illinois mile relay team. On Friday evening he anchored the Salaukis from far back in the pack with a 1:48.6 half-mile effort to a 3:19.4 sprint medley victory over heralded Missouri and Oklahoma State. The time broke the 3:19.8 meet mark set by the Don Bowden-anchored-California team in 1958.

Kansas was the only university team to take double victories in the relays with a 9:48.1 in the distance medley and a 16:55.3 Texas Relays record in the four-mile. The Jayhawk four-mile relay balance was amazing. Splits were Lowell Paul 4:14.6, John Donner 4:14.6, John Lawson 4:12.7, and Herald Hadley 4:13.4.

Oklahoma State's two-mile relay team remained supreme after an undefeated indoor season, running 7:24.0. Jim Metcalf opened with a 1:52.5, then came John Perry 1:50.5, Tom Von Ruden 1:50.6, and Dave Perry 1:50.4. Robin Lingle of Missouri ran an anchor of 1:49.8 but fell three yards short of victory. The Missouri ace also produced a 4:04.0 anchor mile in the distance medley in a losing cause.

John Camien of Emporia State won his fourth straight invitational mile, this one in a slow 4:08.6. The early pace was slow and Camien was unpressed on the final lap after surging to the lead at the gun lap opening.

Other notable victories were a 3:21.5 by East Texas State in the college division sprint medley, 40.4 by Texas Western in the college division 440-yard relay, 1:26.7 by Houston Lee High School in the 880-yard relay, and 3:16.5 by Corpus Christi Ray High in the one-mile relay.

Some uncanny laps were uncorred in the high school one-mile relay, including 47.0 by L. J. Cohen of Corpus Christi Ray, 46.3 by Carl High of Liberty, and 46.7 by Conley Brown of San Jacinto High School.

Oklahoma City, defending champion in the university 440- and 880-yard relays, dropped the baton in the prelims of both events. The mishap occurred at the third exchange station of the 440 with Oklahoma in the lead and at the first exchange in the 880 where the Sooners were almost sure to qualify.

New Mexico Mauls Southern California

Albuquerque, N.M., April 3--In what was touted as one of the best dual meets in the nation this year, the fired-up New Mexico Lobos demolished the Southern California Trojans, perennial dual meet champions, 98 1/3 to 45 2/3. Pre-meet predictors favored the Lobo sprint and field strength from one to 20 points over the Trojan distance power. In order to win the meet the Trojans needed a 27 point sweep in the distances, but had to settle for only eight points as Lobo John Baker won the miler going away in 4:14.2, 17-year-old frosh Pat Cox outdueled Trojan Bruce Bess in the 880, 1:54.1 to 1:55.1, and another frosh, Web Loudat, led a 1-2 Lobo finish in the two-mile with a 9:28.8. It was obvious the mile-high altitude bothered the Trojans.

Southern California's loss was only their second dual meet defeat in 122 meets since a 1945 loss to Caltech and ended a string of 16 straight wins since a 1962 loss to Oregon, 1962 NCAA champion, 75-56. During the last three years, New Mexico also had a good record with 15 wins, one tie (Abilene Christian in 1963), and one loss to the powerful Southern California Striders last year.

The meet began on a similar note to USC's loss to Oregon in 1962. In that meet Oregon javelin thrower Les Tipton opened the meet with a life-time best to upset Trojan Jan Sikorsky and fire up the Ducks. It happened again today as Frank Burgasser opened the meet with a personal best of 241'9" and broke the school record on his next throw with a 245'9 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", one of the leading marks in the nation this year. This performance and the roar of approval of the 6000 partisan fans seemed

to inspire both teams and within the next 30 minutes many outstanding marks were recorded, but the meet was practically decided by the time the second running event, the mile, was completed. Clarence Robinson, New Mexico's excellent jumper went 25'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " for a school record and best mark in the nation this year, only to lose on the next jump to Trojan Wellesley Clayton who jumped 26'0" with no wind, though other marks were wind-aided. In the shot ring, Don Castle of USC took the lead on his second toss of 57'9", but Larry Kennedy, the Lobos' NCAA discus champion, improving with each throw, broke the school record three times and ended with a fine 58'10". It wasn't enough as Trojan Jeff Smith uncorked a great 59'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " on his final toss to up his personal best by 16 inches.

After the mile the meet went somewhat to form and the Trojans appeared listless as New Mexico turned on its sprint power. Bernie Rivers, the talented Lobo soph and apparently recovered from a leg injury, sped to a windy 9.3 while Art Carter took the 220 turn race in a 20.8 with a 5.0 mph aiding wind. He also won the 440 in a fine 47.2 to share double win honors with Fred Knight, who clocked a windy 13.9 in the highs and won the intermediates in a very good 37.6 considering the final two barriers were set at 42 inches instead of the regulation 36 inches. The Trojans only managed four firsts, all in the field events.

Mahoney Samuels won the triple jump with a windy 51'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", but the wind was calm on his only other jump, 50'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", a mark which is second in the nation as of this report. With the meet already won, Lobo coach Hugh Hackett kept Rivers off the mile relay team which won easily anyway from a makeshift Trojan team in a good 3:13.4.

Both teams suffered from injuries, Southern California with Bess and Dennis Carr not in top condition and New Mexico with frosh sprinter Rene Matison out, jumper Ira Robinson with a bad leg, and 6'9 $\frac{1}{2}$ " high jumper Eric Christianson limited to the javelin after a recent leg operation.

Notre Dame, Kentucky State Highlight

Lexington, Ky., April 3--Notre Dame and Kentucky State each won two relay events as 50-degree weather failed to prevent athletes from setting 15 meet records in the second annual University of Kentucky Relays.

Ed Dean and Bill Clark were the key men for Notre Dame as the Irish won the distance medley in 9:51.6 and the 4-mile relay in 17:09.5. Dean anchored the distance medley in 4:09.6 after Clark had run 3:01.9 for 1320. Pat Conroy (1:51.6) and Bill Boyle (48.6) ran the opening legs. Dean and Clark both came back to run four legs on the 4-mile relay two hours later.

Jim Kemp's 46.4 anchor leg gave Kentucky State a 3:11.4 win in the mile relay after they had taken the sprint medley in 3:23.7.

Other relay standouts were Ohio University, making 7:32.6 look easy in the 2-mile relay; Murray State scoring an upset 41.2 win in the 440-yard relay, and Iowa State, winning the shuttle high hurdles in a surprising 59.1.

Top individuals were Willie Moore of Central State, who re-

corded a lifetime best of 9:05.0 in the 3000-meter steeplechase; Jim Albrecht of Northwestern, who pole vaulted 15'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " despite poor facilities, and broke his pole attempting 16'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", and Michigan grad Ernst Soudek, Austrian Olympian, who spun the discus 178'9".

International Olympic Committee

The IOC, to which the Congress of Paris on June 23rd, 1894 entrusted the control and development of the modern Olympic Games, is responsible for the regular celebration of the Games and ensuring they live up to the ideals of Baron Pierre de Coubertin (the man behind their revival) by promoting friendship between the amateur sportsmen of all countries.

The IOC is a permanent organization with headquarters in Lausanne, France. Members are elected for life. The president is Avery Brundage, the retiring chancellor is Otto Mayer. More than 100 national Olympic committees are recognised by the IOC. (From Melvyn Watman's Encyclopedia of Athletics)
