NCAA Team Battle Looms

One NCAA dope sheet, based on the above preview with judgment used to choose among the men rated equal, rates Stanford as the team winner with 41 points. San Jose State is given 32, Oregon State 30, California 29, Southern California 28, New Mexico 25, Brigham Young 23, North Carolina College 23, Oregon 22, Arizona State 22, and Washington State 20.

Stanford's points are quite solid with Larry Questad, who scored 18 points in the 1963 meet, the key figure. Questad has recovered from his injury, apparently won the disputed finish in the USTFF 100, and says he feels better than he has all year. Jim Eshelman, Bob Stoetker and the relay are solid.

Of the massed challengers, San Jose and Southern California seem to have the best chances to improve. Tommie Smith had a little leg problem at Bakersfield but has responded well. Wayne Hermen and Les Bond could help the Spartans if they returned to mid-season form. Mike Gibeau strained a leg at Bakersfield and the 880 may be the toughest field of the meet.

Southern Cal could get a lift from the unpredictable Dennis Carr in the 880, Lew Hoyt could finish first or seventh, and Bill Fosdick could score more than the predicted four points.

Oregon State's 30 points is based on 18 from Morgan Groth, which is asking an awful lot, and the two-time mile champ may not even run both events. Tracy Smith would have to score well in the distances and Tom Wyatt move up in the hurdles if the Beavers are to improve.

Cal is down for six points in a loaded 440 field, but if Forrest Beaty and Dave Archibald rise to the occasion on their home field the Bears could pick another six to 10 and be mighty tough.

New Mexico gets 20 points from Clarence Robinson and then has to struggle, although it has minor potential in a number of events. Brigham Young has Mike Bianco and Al Rockwell as solid scorers, plus distance and relay potential.

North Carolina College's two-man team of Ed Roberts and Norm Tate will pick up its points in the sprints and horizontal jumps.

Oregon blew its chances to defend when it lost distance man Ken Moore and sprinter Dave Blunt. The Ducks now count on Neal Steinhauer and Wade Bell, with hope from Bruce Mortenson in the steeplechase, which may be the weakest event of the meet.

Arizona State has improving Jon Cole in the weights and Glenn Winningham, and that's it.

Washington State depends heavily on Chris Westman in the distances.

Day Speeds 3:56.4, Lindgren 28:21.8

Bakersfield, June 11-12--In a desperate effort to make someone think he belongs on the US national team this summer, smooth striding UCLA junior Bob Day ran the fastest solo mile in history, a 3:56.4 run in the third annual United States Track and Field Federation Champion ships.

Prodded by Coach Jim Bush, Day set out by himself on the first backstretch and nobody was ever close to him after that. Running with a beautifully easy stride similar to Ron Clarke's, Day showed no strain even in the home stretch, as he clocked quarters of 58.5, 58.5, 59.5, and 59.9.

Day's new collegiate record is tied as the ninth fastest mile of all-time, and is the fourth fastest by an American. Nobody has run so fast without the benefit of pacers or competition.

Gerry Lindgren put on another solo show, lapping everyone in

the six-mile. His 28:21.8 broke the collegiate and frosh records. At three-miles in 13:54.6, he was on his way to a great time, but he developed a stitch in his side.

A sensational newcomer, Don Payne of Kansas State, sped to a 46.2 victory in the 440. Running in the outside lane, Payne had such a long lead after the first curve that everyone thought the staggers must be wrong, but they checked out correctly. Lynn Saunders of Abilene Christian, also in an outside lane, almost caught Payne in the home stretch. Dwight Middleton of Southern California, who had run a 46.9 heat from lane six, could run only 47.5 from his inside lane in the final.

Larry Livers of Villanova also jumped into the championship picture with a 51-flat time from the outside lane in the intermediate hurdles. Vance Peterson of Occidental almost beat Livers in the stretch run but he hit the last hurdle. Jerry Talbott, Washington State's all-purpose weapon, found his event with a 51.3 from an outside lane for the 440-yard hurdles.

Doug Brown of Montana established himself as the leading collegiate distance runner with a speedy last 220 in a fast three-mile. Brown ran with Oscar Moore and Washington State's Chris Westman until the last backstretch, then burst away to win in 13:29.0.

Paul Kerry, Southern California sophomore, also appeared in the championship picture, with a perfectly run 13.7 victory in the high hurdles. Idaho State's Ben Miller ran 13.9 against a six-mile wind in his heat, but hit a hurdle in the final and could not get up on his toes again. Kerry broke away from the others at about the fourth hurdle in the windless final.

Other NCAA contenders appeared to be Bob Stoecker of Stanford who threw the discus 186'9 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", Avery Nelson of Clemson of ~~Arizona~~ jumped 49'5 $\frac{3}{4}$ " into a slight breeze, John Tushaus of Arizona threw the javelin 249'2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", and Lynn Headley of Nebraska who won a close 100 in 9.5. Headley barely edged Len Dodson, Larry Questad and Tommie Smith. Questad was behind everyone except Smith at the start, while Smith was two-feet behind Questad.

The slow-starting Smith was also more than two-yards behind Earl Horner and Wayne Hermen into the stretch of the 220 but his fantastic finish gave him a two-yard victory in 20.9. In the 440-yard relay, Smith came into the stretch a foot behind Charley Greene of Nebraska and won by two-yards.

Closest race of the meet was the special two-mile relay. Villanova and Oklahoma State were never more than about two yards apart. Dave Perry jumped Villanova's Noel Carroll in the home stretch, but Carroll's old sprint suddenly materialized and he sped past Perry. Villanova's time was a good, but disappointing, 7:20.4.

Many high school and junior college athletes withdrew from the meet because of pressure from some unknown source. But some high school runners did remarkable jobs. Jim Olsen of Kirkwood, Missouri, ran a 4:06.5 mile, and Rick Riley of Ferris, Washington, ran a 14:08.6 three-mile. Tall, skinny Ron Stjern of Snohomish, Washington, ran 31:28.0 for six-miles.

Kemp Impresses With 46.1

Long Beach, Calif., June 11-12--Kentucky State sophomore Jim Kemp rushed to a 46.1 clocking for 440-yards and established himself as the number one threat in the NCAA finals during the NCAA College Division Championships. He also posted a 46.6 during a heat. Mt. Union's Nate Hawthorne was second at 46.8, followed closely by Luther's Jerry Thompson who also earned the same time. Fresno State's Darel Newman scored something of an upset over Edwin Roberts of North Carolina College as he won the 100 by a tenth in 9.5 after losing a heat to the Olympian by a tenth. Roberts came back to win the 220 turn in an impressive 20.6.

Luther's Gene Takle won both the three-mile and six mile (14:15.2 and 30:03.8) and placed second in the steeplechase (10:11.4) as he gave his school 28 of its 46 surprising second place points. San Diego State won the title with 67. Third was Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo at 45 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Norm Tate of North Carolina College was the lone other double

winner with 24'10" in the long jump and 51'7½" in the triple jump.

Crespi High School of Encino, Calif., established a new inter-scholastic four-mile relay record by eight-tenths in 17:41.2.

Hodge Wins With 7624 as Toomey Injured

Walnut, Calif., June 11-12--The SPAAAU Decathlon Championships, first decathlon competition of the year on the west coast, al-

most produced a world's record. As it turned out, Russ Hodge won the two-day, 10-event contest with 7624 points.

Had it not been for a freak accident Bill Toomey may possibly have broken C. K. Yang's 8089. He established life-time bests for decathlon competition in six of the first seven events with 10.6 for 100-meters, 24'8" in the long jump, 43'¾" in the shot put, 47.0 for 400-meters for 4172 points the first day, and 14.8 in the highs, and 137'0" in the discus. The only event in which he failed to improve was the fourth event, the high jump, where he did 6'¼". Then it happened. On his way down from 12'11½" in the pole vault, the spikes of his left shoe carved a large gash in his right calf. It was a four inch gash that revealed his muscles. He was rushed to the hospital, where it was determined that the muscle sac was ruptured but no muscle injury and he should be back in training in ten days. Had he thrown 210-feet and run 4:11.4--both distinct possibilities--he would have beaten Yang's record by a point. And of course, he might have gone higher in the pole vault.

Hodge has been running only two weeks so he was pleased and feels that he will be over 8000 by the AAU meet. Paul Herdman and Don Shy scored 7600 and 7486 points, respectively.

The conditions were good, and the wind was allowable at all times. The meet was held at twilight on Friday and during the afternoon on Saturday, when there was some smog that affected some of the athletes.

Grelle Wins, Runs US Record--3:55.4

Vancouver, British Columbia, June 16--Jim Grelle, 28, ran the greatest race of his career here--he won a significant victory and broke the US national record for the mile.

Not accustomed to always winning, Grelle not only won but won by the huge margin of 7.1 seconds over an international field in 3:55.4, but his time bettered Jim Beatty's national standard by a tenth.

Far behind was Great Britain's Tony Harris (4:02.5) and Cary Weisiger (4:02.8). Last place among 10 runners was Peter Snell, 140 yards behind in 4:15.4. Snell complained afterwards that he had been sick all afternoon, but didn't want to disappoint the crowd by withdrawing. "This is the first time I've run such a terrible race. It will take a long time to get over the shame of coming in last," he said to the 14,000 spectators shortly after the race. To which the crowd responded enthusiastically with applause.

The race had been set up as a grudge race for the American and New Zealander, but afterwards Grelle called Snell "a remarkable sportsman."

Snell looked off-form from the start. He was well back as they circled the Empire Stadium track and on the final lap, when he should have put in his drive, he began to fall back instead.

Bob Tobler beat Canada's Bill Crothers in a 47.5 quarter-mile and Harry Jerome won the 100 in 9.8 after overtaking Pablo McNeil and Paul Winder.

Larrieu Breaks US 3 Mile Mark

Toronto, Ontario, June 10--Nurtured on the distance running of Bruce Kidd, Toronto spared no expense in assembling one of the finest three-mile fields of all time. A record turnout of 19,633 rewarded the sponsors for their efforts, and the crowd in turn was rewarded with a fine 13:03.4 (actually 13:03.3) by Ron Clarke, and personal bests by Ron Larrieu with 13:11.4 and Billy Mills with 13:12.0 both under Bob Schul's American record of 13:15.6. Additionally, they witnessed a rare defeat of Peter Snell by the hometown hero, Bill Crothers, at 880 yards.

The three-mile field consisted of Ron Clarke, fresh from his record breaking 13:00.4 at Compton on the way to 5000, a sharp-looking Alby Thomas, Bob Schul, who has been tuning up with miles, the veteran Bill Baillie, Billy Mills, the American indoor three mile champ, Ron Larrieu, second fastest American at three-miles, and the local boy, Dave Ellis. With the starter's gun, Clarke moved purposefully into the lead closely followed by Thomas. The first lap went 64.8 and the half in 2:09.2-a record pace. Larrieu, Mills and Schul were just off the pace while Baillie and Ellis were running their own race. Thomas carried the pace for the next two laps passing the mile in 4:21.1 with Clarke and Mills hot on his heels in 4:21.3. Larrieu at 4:21.6 and Schul at 4:21.9 were in good position. At the end of the ninth furlong Clarke made his move, and he made it big by

opening up a ten yard gap with a 63.4 lap. Larrieu put a little daylight between himself and the trio of Thomas, Mills and Schul. First to fifth position now covered about 25 yards.

The half-way point was turned in 6:29.3, which is better than 13 minutes for three, but astonishing Larrieu had moved up tight behind Clarke with a 63.5 lap. The other three were 30 yards back. Larrieu stuck to Clarke like glue for the next three laps, and bravely tried to pass him at the two mile post--both having identical times of 8:43.1, almost a lifetime best for Larrieu. Mills went by in 8:47.8, Schul in 8:48.4 and Thomas in 8:48.8. With nine furlongs left, Clarke made his second big move and opened up 25 yards on Larrieu. From then on in, it was all Clarke with a 2:07 final half and a 61.4 last quarter. If it were not for their lagging pace on the sixth and ninth laps, it would have been under 13-minutes. It was still the second fastest three-mile of record and Clarke's answer to Jazy's bid for 5000 mark. Larrieu with 13:11.4 became the new American record holder. Mills' 13:12.0 made him the second fastest American. Schul's old American record was 13:15.6 shutting him to equal 10th on the three-mile list. Larrieu and Mills become fifth and equal to a tie for sixth, respectively. Mills closed fast on Larrieu with a 2:07.8 last half to Larrieu's 2:11.6. Thomas finished with a lot left in 13:20.3. Bill Baillie edged Ellis with a 13:28.7 to 13:29.0. Billis broke Doug Kyle's old Canadian mark of 13:12.2 though Kidd has a faster 13:17.0 out in the States.

The last time anyone beat Snell in a major race over 800m-880y was in February of 1965 in New Zealand when George Kerr did it. Both Crothers and Snell agreed that the slow first quarter put the race into Crothers' hands because of his superior quarter-miling ability. There was a rabbit for the pace, but he could only tow Snell through a 55.4 and Crothers a 55.7. With 220 yards left, Snell burst from the pack. Coach Foote had told Crothers to move when Snell did, so, Bill took out after the New Zealander. Coming out of the turn into the straight, Snell was pulling away from Crothers, but Crothers then opened up and slowly overtook Snell at 40 yards out and inched away to win in 1:48.4. Snell, who ran 1:48.6, took the defeat philosophically by saying that there is quite a strain to remain undefeated, and if anyone was to beat him he preferred it be Crothers.

The mile, coming after such a great three-mile, was anticlimactic. Jim Grelle won handily from John Davies off a slow 2:00.5 and 3:03.2 pace with a fast last lap of 55.1. With the long straight and very tight turns of the Toronto track, fast quarter times are unusual. Ollan Cassell took the early lead and held it to win in 47.2 from Adolph Plummer with 47.8. Harry Jerome split in the splits by taking the 100 with an explosive burst into the tape in 9.3 (wind 4 mph) and losing the 220 to Paul Drayton 20.9 to 21.1.

Olympic Record Achievements

Most gold medals won is nine by Paavo Nurmi (Finland), who between 1920 and 1928 was victorious in seven individual and two team races.

Most individual wins is eight by Ray Ewry (US) in the standing jump events between 1900 and 1908.

Most gold medals at one Olympics is six by Nurmi in 1924 (1500 m., 3000 m. team and individual winner, 5000., cross-country team and individual winner).

Most individual gold medals at one Olympics is four by Alvin Kraenzlein (US) at 60 m., 110 m., and 200 m., hurdles and long jump champion in 1900; and Nurmi in 1924 as above.

Most gold medals in one event is three by Ewry (standing high jump and standing long jump in 1900, 1904 and 1908), John Flanagan, US (hammer in 1900, 1904 and 1908), Frank Wykoff, US (4 x 100 m. relay in 1928, 1932 and 1936) and Al Oerter, US (discus in 1956, 1960 and 1964).
