Sensational Performances at AAU

San Diego, Calif., June 26-27--For the first time in the history of track and field, an athlete from the United States has established a world record at a distance longer than two-miles. And not one, but two of Uncle Sam's home-bred runners are claimants to the new world six-mile standard of 27:11.6. The sensationally exciting race occurred during an AAU championship that produced so many good performances that every winning mark exceeded those recorded in the NCAA finals.

The record remained for two of America's greatest track heroes: Billy Mills, the 26-year-old Indian who returned the number one upset of the 1964 Olympics, and Gerry Lindgren, who upset the Russians last year at 10,000-meters at 18-years of age and who this year defied the NCAA boycott to compete in this meet. Often times, a world record bid in a distance race is relatively dull competitively. But here, never more than three yards separated the two runners, and usually it was no more than a couple of feet. That, coupled with the fact that the crowd was made aware of the record pace midway contributed to the feverish excitement--an emotional response never previously felt in this country for a distance race.

Mills and Lindgren took off at a swift gallop and covered the first quarter in 64.5 and the mile in 4:29.1. Lindgren took over the lead in the fifth lap, and they exchanged it a half-dozen more times through the three-mile post which they arrived at in 13:39.8. The slowest mile was the fourth at 4:36.5, but on the very next lap Gerry forced the pace down to 67.5. They continued through a 68.0 18th 440, and it became apparent they were fresh and strong enough to push for the record. Five-miles went in 22:49.9, and they needed a 4:27.9 final mile. The next two quarters were lopped off in 68.4 and 69.2, with Gerry hugging a stride behind Billy. They needed a 2:10.3 last half, and they reeled off a 66.1 next-to-last-lap. And now they had to have a 64.2. At this distance, that was fast but it seemed possible.

Long before the final lap began every one of the 15,320 spectators on hand for the second day of the meet (total attendance 25,720) had scrambled to his feet. It was difficult to ascertain just how fast the pace was as they rounded into the back stretch but it appeared swifter than the last quarter. About two laps previously, it had looked as though Mills was a bit wearier than Lindgren and thus it was surprising Billy held his yard lead as they charged down the entire backstretch. As they headed into the final curve, Lindgren churned alongside of Mills. And it was the next 120 yards that sent the crowd into a frenzy of hysteria and incoherence. Hip-to-hip, breast-to-breast, and shoulder-to-shoulder, they kicked frantically down the homestretch. A bare inch hardly seemed to separate them, and until the last few yards it was impossible to determine who would win. Finally, it was Mills who exploded through the tape six-hundredths of a second ahead of Lindgren, as they both clipped 6.2 seconds off Ron Clarke's 1963 world mark.

Lindgren had run the final 440 in 57.9 and Mills in 58.0! With the record, Mills had proven that his Olympic triumph was no fluke and Lindgren probably did more to advance a solution to the US's ugly track civil war than any other individual or event.

The only possible disappointing aspect to the record was that the distance had not been over the more standard 10,000-meter distance. In fact, shortly prior to the race Mills told an official, "If you can have the course set up for 10,000-meters, I can give you two records." But the officials were unable to measure the longer distance in time.

The next two finishers also gave US distance running a boost. Bill Morgan finished third in 28:33.8 and Doug Rustad, who came from oblivion this year, fourth in 28:44.0 to move into seventh and 11th on the all-time US six-mile list. Last year was the first time any American had broken 28 minutes.

How such an event could be surpassed for excitement was hard to conceive, but the mile came close. At its conclusion, 18-year old Jim Ryun had become the fourth fastest miler of all-time, erased the American record, come within 1.3 seconds of the existing record and 1.8 of the pending mark, and handed three-time Olympic

gold medalist Peter Snell his first ever sub-four minute mile defeat. All this was done with a 3:55.3 mile that was partially sparked by a 53.9 final quarter!

The leading contenders, Peter Snell, Jim Grelle and Ryun, elected to stick in the rear for most of the first half-mile. The first significant change occurred at the 1200 mark when Josef Odlozil jumped into the lead and quickly built up a lead. Meanwhile, Snell, Grelle and Ryun began working their way forward and were no worse than fourth at the gun. Into the backstretch, it was Odlozil still leading by several yards but Ryun had assumed second place--and this is probably where he won the race. As they charged into the final curve, Grelle was up with Ryun on the outside and both were passing faltering Odlozil. Snell was a stride back. On the homefront, Ryun pulled away from Grelle, who was eventually passed by the fastest-kicking Snell. Snell and Grelle finished in 3:55.4 and 3:55.5 for the fastest non-winning second and third place finishes. Ryun's last lap was a lightning 53.9; Snell and Grelle did 54.0 and 54.1, respectively. Only Michel Jazy, Snell and Herb Elliott have ever run faster than Ryun, and the mile has been run faster only six times. Ryun bettered Grelle's 11-day old American record by a tenth. And what would have happened if Dycor Burleson and Tom O'Hara had been in the race?

John Garrison, who surprised everyone at the California Relays, was inadvertently hit by Grelle in the early stages of the race and limped into a 4:22.3 last place finish. Lap times:

Bob Schul, the third of four athletes who have done so much to put American distance running into the limelight in the past 18 months, gave strong indication he is rounding into shape with a career best and an American record three-mile run of 13:10.4 and a victory over New Zealand's Neville Scott and suddenly consistent Ron Larriau. A leading figure in the fight for athletes' rights in the US, Schul spent the entire morning before his race standing and directing the reconstruction of the steeplechase approach area--which was a horrible mess.

It was a three-way battle from the start, with the order virtually the same until the last lap: Larriue, Scott and Schul. They passed the mile and two-miles in 4:23.0 and 8:50.6. Larriue has good speed but not quite as good as Schul and Scott, so he took off at the gun and built up a slight lead on the backstretch. As they came off the final curve, Scott passed Larriue and it looked for a while that he might win. But Schul came on the fastest in the final 100 yards and overtook Larriue and Scott for a four-ten-thousand victory. Scott bettered his career best with a 13:10.8 and Larriue equalled his pending American record time of 13:11.4. Both times represented the fastest second and third place finishes. Lloyd Burson of Western New Mexico was fourth with a best-ever by 7.0 seconds of 13:38.8.

Scott is the fourth fastest ever with the seventh official fastest clocking. Schul is tied for fifth fastest with the ninth best time, and Larriue is tied for eighth fastest with a time equal to the 11th best.

There were many amazing feats in this meet, not the least of which must be credited to John Pennel in the pole vault. Severely limited in the Olympics by a chronic slipped disc injury, Pennel returned to the States and did absolutely no exercising until 2½ weeks before the AAU--"no running, no gymnastics, no weightlifting." Here, he cleared 17'0"--and it was only the seventh time, since the Olympics, practice or competition, he has used a pole. Pennel, of course, was the first man in history to vault 17-feet, and this was only his second ever 17-footer and the sixth by anyone. He passed 15'0", made 15'6" on his second try, and then 16'0", 16'4" and 17'0" on his first attempts. He then tried for a world's record of 17'5", and believe it or not came remarkably close on his second try. Jeff Chase and Bob Seagren both vaulted 16'4" but Chase was declared the better of the two.

For the third meet this season, Hal Connolly bettered his own official world's record of 231'10" with a mark of 232'1", which fell short of his pending marks of 233'2" and 233'9½". Ed Burke came up with his second best-ever throw of 224'5". George Frenn had a foul throw over 218-feet but had to settle for 210'2".

The steeplechase was tragic. Many errors have occurred in this event but this time the lap times were announced to the athletes as 30 seconds too fast and the laps-to-go counter at the finish line indicated an extra lap remaining for at least the last five laps. This explains what looked like a slow pace. But apparently only George Young, the fourth of America's great distance runners, was confused by the mix-up. The gun was shot at the proper lap after officials realized the error but not until after Young had passed the lap-counter which read "2". George had saved his kick for what he thought was the last lap. The other runners all kicked home at the proper spot but continued on when they realized that Young was still going. Afterwards, third placer Fred Best said, "That final lap was the most grueling thing I have ever had to do in track."

Young finished the first race, without a kick, in 8:50.6 and the second race in 9:57.0. Fortunately, Young was ahead at the proper finish, but can you imagine the howl that would have been raised had Young been third because he honestly believed the lap-counter and had been left off the US International team?

At least 11 undergraduate collegians ignored the NCAA boycott of the meet, and three of them were winners. Southern's George Anderson, a junior, won the 100 in 9.3 after being advanced to the finals by special consideration after his blocks slipped in the semi-finals and he finished last. Nevada's Otis Burrell, also a junior, took the high jump at 7'0" from Ed Caruthers and Bill McClellon. Re-

portedly, the Attorney General of Nevada has declared he will take the problem to the courts if any punitive action is taken against Burrell or the school. Oregon State's Morgan Groth, a senior with another semester of eligibility, captured the 880 in 1:47.7 from surprising George Germann and Tom Farrell, another senior with cross country and indoor eligibility.

The 440 went to Ollan Cassell in 46.1 as two other NCAA defiers, Don Owens and Theron Lewis, placed second and fourth in 46.2 and 46.4. Lewis was not informed of the correct starting time for the finals, and complained of improper warm-up time. He went out fast, still led into the homestretch but faded to fourth. Mike Larrabee ran sixth and out of the money in his semi-final heat. He has been troubled a painful sciatic nerve that had forced him to work out only once every four days.

After Paul Drayton withdrew from the finals of the 220 because of an injury, Adolph Plummer won the furlong in the good time of 20.6 as the next three finishers all recorded lifetime bests of 20.7--Jim Hines, Tom Randolph and John Carlos. Willie Davenport repeated his 13.6 heat in the final to beat Blaine Lindgren and Roger Morgan by a tenth. Richmond Flowers had hurdle troubles and finished last after being advanced to the finals for the same reasons as Anderson. Don Shy was clocked in 13.6 in a heat but failed to finish in the finals. Rex Cawley easily won the 440-yard intermediates in 50.3. Ron Whitney just did catch Jay Luck for second in 50.7.

Ralph Boston won the long jump at 26'3½" and Art Walker the triple jump at 53'1". Darrell Horn finished second in both events at 25'5½" and 51'1½". Ludwig Danek of Czechoslovakia annexed the discus title at 205'7". Jay Silvester was second at 202'7" and then third in the shot at 61'10¾". John McGrath was fourth in the discus at 187'0" and first in the shot at 63'0", his outdoor seasonal best. Bill Floerke returned a good series and won the javelin at 258'7".

The Southern California Striders easily won the team title with 102 points.

Jazy Smashes 2 Mile Mark With 8:22.6

Melun, France, June 23--Michel Jazy, postponing his vacation to disprove critics of his competitive ability, defeated Australia's Ron Clarke by 20 yards, 8:22.6 to 8:24.8, with both men breaking Bob Schul's world record of 8:26.4. Running together by agreement through six laps, they passed the half-mile posts in 2:04.0, 4:11.4 and 6:19.6. In the final 880-yards Jazy began a sustained kick and was two-seconds ahead and gaining at the 3000-meter mark, 7:49.0 to 7:51.0, although Clarke was closing on the Frenchman at the finish. The 3000-meter time lowered Jazy's own record by two-tenths and gave him two records for the run.

Jazy was grateful that Clarke had pushed the pace on the fifth and sixth laps to help a record even though both knew that Jazy was faster at this distance, and Clarke, though disappointed at losing, was pleased that he had broken the former record and lowered his personal best from 8:32.0.
